WHIP ANYTHING ON EARTH SIR

Whoop! Look out! Modest Statement of U.S. Representative Gillet

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—"The naval committee," said Representative Gillet, of the house naval committee, discussing the appropriations for ships of the Dreadnought type, "have asked for the building of a ship of 20,000 tons displacement, which is 2,000 tons more than England's famous Dreadnought. We have asked in addition for the building of two more boats of the torpedo boat destroyer type, and for some submarines. These are the only types asked for in the appropriation. The new fighting model is to carry ten twelve-inch guns, where an ordinary battleship of 16,000 tons would carry only four.

"It is estimated that this ship will be the equal in strength of two ordinary battleships. Her increased size will give her marked advantage besides the increased number of guns. The more room she has the larger will be the boiler capacity, and consequently the greater will be her speed. I am not in favor of building any ships of war, but when nations so far advanced as England, Germany and France continue in the work of increasing their navies, we must of necessity keep pace with them. I think ships of this size and man for man we are the match of any country on the face of the earth."

BRITISH ARMY REFORM AGAIN BROUGHT BEFORE THE PUBLIC NOTICE

Mr. Haldane Announces Plan For Re-organization.—Regular Troops to be Divided Into Six Divisions of Three Brigades Each, With Four Brigades of Cavalry.—

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Mr. Haldane, speaking to a Glasgow audience recently, said the plan had been perfected by the Government by which the regular army would be organized. The plans were far-reaching. Instead of one army corps, and another of small divisions, some of them rather ragged, they had organized regular troops according to this new scheme, which had been worked out by the General Staff, and by the highest military authorities, into six great divisions of three brigades each, with four brigades of cavalry. That was the organization of the home army for the future. As part of the scheme, they had assigned artillery to these divisions.

They were taking the batteries of artillery that were surplus to the requirements of the fighting batteries—that was to say, between thirty and forty batteries—and they were forming these into training schools or brigades, consisting each of three batteries, and they were going to bring these surplus batteries into various parts of the country to form training schools in order to train more artillery men for the service of the fighting line, for the fighting batteries. Two of these training brigades were coming to Scotland, one to Glasgow, and one to Edinburgh. He hoped now there would therefore, be a general artillery spirit amongst the people. The last twelve months had been a period of thinking, but it had also been a period of action.

"HELLO" GIRLS GO ON A STRIKE

They Will Not Submit To Bell Telephone Co's New Order

TORONTO, Jan. 30.—The management of the Bell Telephone Company in Toronto have made new regulations which in the course of the strike at the switchboard will be changed from five to eight. The girls have held a meeting and are determined to strike on Friday when the new regulations come into force, and the Dominion Labor Department at Ottawa is sending Deputy Minister MacKenzie King to Toronto to seek a settlement of the difficulty. There are between two and three hundred girls affected. The Bell Company says the wages will be increased, but the girls contend that the demands of the work are a severe strain on the nervous system, and they cannot work long hours without suffering in July.

GAELIC LEAGUE SHUT UP PLAY

Resented The Sentiment of a Play Which Was Shown in Dublin

DUBLIN, Jan. 31.—A play by the Irish dramatist Synge, "The Playboy of the Western World," which was produced at the Abbey Theatre last Saturday night, has excited a rising tide of disapprobation, which culminated tonight in a riotous scene. The play was completely howled down, and theatre had to be cleared by the police.

The malcontents, led by the Gaelic League, complain that the play reflects unjustly upon the character of the western Irish peasantry, by representing them as shielding a self-accused parrot from justice. The audience tonight was composed of two opposing factions, the students of Trinity College being on the side of the author, who was supported also by William Butler Yeats, the Irish poet, while on the other side were the members of the Gaelic League. The producers of the play have expressed their intention of continuing the performances as a protest against the attacks upon the success of the theatre.
