A DRAWBACK.—On Monday morning at eight o'clock sharp was displayed one of the finest and most interesting sights recorded when over fifty gasoline fishing boats simultaneously started their engines, and made their way out of Rustico Harbor towards their fishing grounds in the Gulf. That day was one of the most favorable of the season and many thousand dollars worth of gear was placed at the mercy of the waves. Expectation was at its highest, when on Tuesday morning an altogether different feeling filled hundreds of brave hearts. The wind and the high tide caused the ice that had loosened to block the channel leading down Justice Bay. The anxious fishermen made strenuous attempts to overcome the barrier, but all in vain. Hundreds of dollars worth of gear had had been made ready for setting remained on the shore. Imagine the disappointment experienced by the fishermen in general. Towards evening the passage opened and gave new anticipations. On Wednesday morning an early start was again made in order to overhaul the herring nets which had been set on Monday in order to procure bait for the obster traps. Early in the morning the wind arose causing breakers on the bar outside of the harbour lighting the fishermen to stay ashore. At about 8 o'clock in the morning the ebbing tide going in a rage was carrying with it ice of a great thickness tearing stages from their blocks. The stage in front of Mr. Jerome Doucette's fishing shanty was destroyed. That in front of Mr. Joseph N. Pineau's fishing shanty, also that in front of Mr. B. LePage lobster factory owned by Mr. Aquila Rolland were crushed by the drifting ice. Messrs. John Perry and John D. Pineau's boats had a narrow escape and were saved only by the presence of a man of the owners who hauled them ashore. Such is the fishermen's luck.—R.

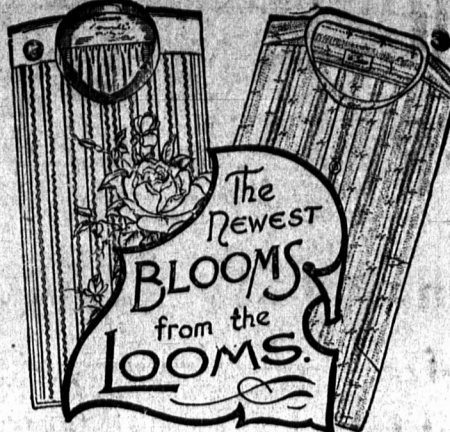
