ENFORCEMENT OF LAW.

It is a comparatively easy matter to lay down on the chart, with rule and compass, a course which, if followed, will lead safely and inevitably to the desired haven.

We have written, in the calm of the editorial sanctum, of the enforcement of the Prohibition Act. We have had letters and personal interviews commending the course mapped out, and assurances of co-operation from sincere and well meaning friends of the Temperance cause.

There are many cross currents to be encountered, among them the indifference of friends, the fear that action may injure one political party and bring credit to the other, the determined and organized opposition of those who profit by the traffic.

Prohibition is the law of the province, as much a law as that against murder or theft or crime of any kind. Its enforcement is as necessary as that of any other law.

DISHONEST SHIPMENTS.

The following news item, dated Ottawa, July 22, appears elsewhere in this paper: "The department of trade and commerce will probably take action against certain Canadian shippers, based on complaints received from the old country that dried apples marked 'fancy evaporated' have been found to contain seeds and cores below the top layer, which consisted of high class products."

Through the dishonesty of perhaps only one shipper, or at most of only a few, the whole Canadian trade in evaporated apples falls under suspicion. This point should be kept constantly in view.

No doubt the guilty parties in this case will be found out, as the Fruit Marks Act leaves little room for escape, and it is hoped that, for the good name of Canada, they will be so severely dealt with as to destroy their appetite for that kind of trading in the future.

What has occurred in the matter of this shipment occurs quite frequently in cases where detection is a more difficult matter. Even Prince Edward Island produce has fallen under suspicion because of the dishonesty of one or two shippers.

We believe that Prince Edward Island farmers, as a class, are as honest as those of any other country in the world but it will not be denied that there are at least a few among them who would not scruple about making a dishonest dollar by palming off an inferior article, if there was a reasonable chance to escape detection. In fact this has occurred.

more than once and honest farmers have more than once been humiliated by reading in the newspapers of our sister provinces, under glaring headlines at that, of fowl stuffed with frozen grain, of pressed hay stuffed with refuse, of "large apples at the top of the barrel" and all charged unjustly and unfairly to "dishonest Prince Edward Island farmers."

Prince Edward Island is admirably situated for a thorough inspection system. Its isolation, of which we so often complain, especially in winter or when telegraphic communication is interrupted, might well be used to make it one of the best sources of food supply on the continent.

Our butter and cheese are now under inspection and they have won a name for themselves in the British market. With a law compelling the inspection of every product shipped from the province and holding the producer responsible until the article is finally disposed of the name of Prince Edward Island could be made a name to conjure with in the markets of the world.

Already we have a continental reputation for pure seeds and they are in demand from one side of the continent to the other. There are safeguards around the seed business, it is true, but sufficient care is not being exercised in separating the many varieties and the result very often is disappointment on the part of the purchaser. Strict inspection would prevent mistakes, wilful or accidental, in this respect and would ensure good seed true to name to the buyer and a good name for Prince Edward Island seeds.

In the case of products sold in packages or singly, such as fowl, pressed hay, butter, cheese, eggs, &c., each article should bear not only a P. E. Island trade mark, but also the name of the producer. Should the article turn out fraudulent it could be traced to its source.

The good name of the province is its greatest asset. That name should be on every product exported, and so sacredly guarded that it would be an assurance that the product is just what it claims to be.

In another column "Traveller" directs attention to the unsatisfactory train service between Stellarton and Pictou. We are also informed that similar delays occur between St. John and Pt. du Chene. Although the C. P. R. arrives almost invariably on time at St. John, and the Ocean Limited at Painsec, there is usually a delay before arriving at Pt. du Chene, causing serious inconvenience, especially at Charlottetown, by the late arrival of passengers and mails. These are matters which it would be well to keep constantly before the railway authorities as there is a tendency among officials as well as among ordinary individuals to allow neglect to develop.

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TRAVELLER COMPLAINS.

Sir—I wish to draw your attention to a very unsatisfactory train service between Stellarton and Pictou. I understand that the express train connecting with the Island boats have only been on time three times this summer, notwithstanding that the I. C. R. is nearly always on time at Stellarton, where they appear to hitch up freight trains to carry mails and passengers to Pictou. On last Thursday the 18th inst, the train coming from St. John arrived at Stellarton in time and was forty minutes late getting into Pictou and we can say the same about the noon train coming from Halifax, she nearly always arriving on time at Stellarton but getting delayed between there and Pictou.
