Graham Rogers, W. G. Church, J. S. Perry, M. Olga Rogers and Albert C. Saunders all of Summerside. There is also notice of the granting of letters patent incorporating the Prince Motors, Ltd. The members are Messrs. H. T. Holman, J. LeRoy Holman, Leonard McNeill, H. H. Muttart and D. F. McNeill all of Summerside. This company has a capital stock of \$20,000, divided into 200 shares of \$100 each.

THE MOTOR VEHICLE LAW.—The Royal Gazette of May 25th, contains a proclamation from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, to the following effect: "Whereas, doubt exists to the proper interpretation of paragraph (a) of the restrictions regarding the operation of the "Motor Vehicle Law" on certain roads in this Province on Tuesdays and Fridays as contained in the Proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor, dated the 29th day of April, A. D. 1918. And whereas, it is deemed expedient to remove such doubt; I have therefore thought fit by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Executive Council of this Province to repeal the aforementioned paragraph (a) and the same is hereby repealed; and I do order and direct that the following paragraph be and the same is hereby substituted in lieu thereof: (a) Excepting upon such roads or highways as were open to Motor Vehicles in the year 1917 on every day of the week, no Motor Vehicle shall be operated on Tuesdays and Fridays upon any public roads or highways in this Province. These restrictions and the restrictions with respect to the hours and days upon which Motor Vehicles may be operated upon the Hillsborough Bridge, shall not apply to Clergymen or Medical Practitioners, or to the Commissioner of Public Works of this Province while in the performance of their professional or official duties, respectively. Provided, however, that none of the persons so mentioned shall operate a Motor Vehicle on said Bridge while any horse or horse and carriage is crossing thereon. Of which all persons concerned are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly."

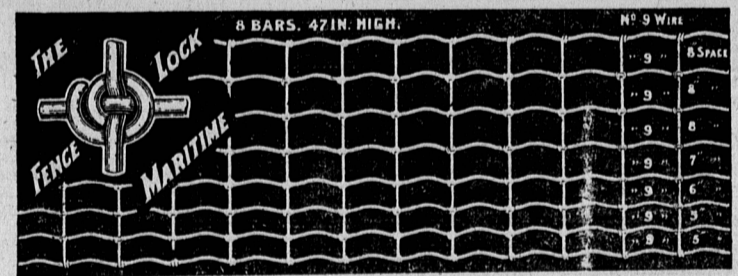
