EASTERN ITEMS.—The season has taken a change and all nature is putting on an autumn look. The harvest is gathered, the farmers are busy preparing for thrashing and at ending to the numerous jobs about the premises. The proceeds of their work are far from satisfactory, and every industry will feel the farmer's failure. From conversation with some of the best farmers, and from observation, I don't think the crops in the eastern section will turn out half an average crop and the quality is poor besides.—The fishermen here likewise made a poor season's work, and as the weather is now growing stormy and fish are scarce they may count the season about ended.—Our summer visitors are returning south after spending a pleasant summer among their provincial friends, and we believe will carry with them sweet and pleasant memories of their northern sojourn.—Considerable interest is manifested in the approaching plebiscite, and I think the east will speak with no uncertain sound on the matter. For years no rum shop has existed in these eastern sections, and public sentiment is strong against them.—A few fishing vessels still hover around the East Point in quest of the mackerel whose parents were seized years ago.—The little schooner belonging to Sambro, which was sunk here a few weeks ago, has broken up and parts have come ashore in different places.

THE electors of Harrington were treated last Monday night to a stirring and eloquent lecture on the burning question of the day—Prohibition—by Rev. A. D. McLeod. In forcible and undeniable terms the Rev. gentleman explained that part of the question which has greatly agitated the public mind viz. the revenue. Instead of having to bear the burden of direct taxation if Prohibition were ushered in, he clearly showed that if the anti-prohibitionists win the day direct taxation must inevitably follow, as the country is year after year sinking lower and lower financially. Out of the \$7,000,000 obtained by the government from the liquor traffic only \$3,000,000 are received into the revenue from liquor consumed as beverages, and, continued the lecturer, you all know that on the highest possible authority 75 per cent of the crimes throughout the Dominion are attributed to intemperance and as it requires \$6,000,000 to administer justice our revenue will be recouped if we should lower the percentage of crimes committed by inebriates to 50 per cent; but as the percentage is 75 it should be clear to every unbiased mind that instead of having a deficit on account of the abolition of the rum traffic our country would be more prosperous, there could be a greater impetus to trade and commerce and our treasury would be considerably richer. The meeting closed after the unanimous thanks of the audience were tendered the learned speaker for his interesting and instructive lecture.
