HOUSE—COMMONS LEADER ARRESTED

Unemployed In Demonstrations

Rioters Numbering 50,000 In England And Scotland Smash Shop Windows And Help Themselves.

GOLD MINING INDUSTRY WILL NOT SUFFER

Ontario Min. of Mines Makes Statement Re Canadian Mines.

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 1.—"The possibility that the gold mining industry will suffer by reason of the tumultuous changes that have taken place in the world's financial relationships, is extremely remote," declared Hon. Charles McCrea, Ontario Minister of Mines, in a public statement tonight. He pointed out that the gold mines of the Dominion constitute an important industry—an industry that "should be close to the hearts of the people of the country."

"Instead of gold bullion becoming less valuable, it would appear to be more desirable than ever," the Minister's statement continued. "Great Britain and other countries which have taken action which is described as going off the gold standard, have actually taken steps to prevent further loss of the precious metal and are endeavoring to restore their former reserves. There seems little danger of United States, with five billion dollars' worth, or France, with another huge total, doing or permitting anything which would lessen the worth of their enormous holdings, such as sanctioning any scheme of demonetization. "Nor is it likely that the British Empire, which produces three-quarters of the world's gold, and possesses billions of dollars' worth of ore, will propose anything which will diminish the value of these great resources."

LONDON, Oct. 1.—In Glasgow, Scotland; Salford, Lancashire, and Bristol and London, demonstrations were attempted by crowds of unemployed today and tonight. In all cases mounted police armed with batons proved sufficient to handle the disturbances, although the mob on Glasgow Green numbered fully 50,000. A number of the rioters and some policemen were slightly injured, and numerous arrests were effected.

Labor Member Arrested

The most important disturbance was that at Glasgow, which finally ended tonight in the arrest of John McGovern, turbulent Labor member of the House of Commons. Scotland's principal industrial city was the scene of various demonstrations during the day. Early, thousands of men and women paraded but despite constant singing and shouting, and traffic holdups, order was maintained. The corporation received a deputation of fifteen and afterwards agreed by a vote of 57 to 38 to remit the grievances to the public assistance committee.

Glasgow's main disturbances occurred tonight. As the crowd was driven from the famous Green they attacked shops, smashing windowpanes and helping themselves to whatever they could lay their hands on. Residents of nearby tenements joined in the disorder by hurling missiles at the police. Hatchets, hammers, iron bars, loaded sticks, chair legs and broken bottles were among the improvised weapons that figured in the melee. Mounted and foot police patrolled the city until after midnight, dispersing groups of demonstrators.

ASSIGNMENT

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 1.—D. L. Jemmett, Ltd., with head office at Toronto, Ont., made an assignment before O. E. Lennox, assistant master at Osgoode Hall today. Liabilities of the company were totalled at \$75,000. The largest claims were filed by the Northern Exploration Mines, Ltd., \$22,387, Northern Canada Supply Co., \$9,917 and Cobalt Reduction Co., \$5,050. The Imperial Bank has a claim of \$13,400, secured by assignment of leases and pledges of all ore in dumps. Only \$27.45 is credited to the company in cash. Machinery is valued at \$20,000, real estate, \$15,000; stock and shares in other companies, \$16,700. A. J. Hardy was appointed custodian.

Wheat Exports

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 1.—Wheat exports from the port of Vancouver for the current crop year to date total 6,111,02 bushels, almost two million bushels below exports for the corresponding period a year ago. During the past week shipments were 619,955 bushels, while bookings already disclosed for October amount to 1,994,133. Elevator stocks today were 9,210,371 bushels with 735,000 bushels in terminals or en route.

U.S. SENATOR NERVOUS ABOUT FOREIGN TRADE

Predicts Complete Collapse of Country's Outside Business—Says States And France Left "Holding The Bag."

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Oct. 1. Senator Key Pittman, Democrat, of Nevada, predicts a complete collapse of this country's foreign trade unless the United States acts to reduce the wide disparity between the value of gold and silver.

The Senator, who advocates the calling of an international silver conference, said that before long all nations, with the exception of the United States and France, will be off the gold standard and will trade where their money has the greatest value.

"By going off the gold standard," he said, "Great Britain left the United States and France 'holding the bag' and that bag is filled with gold that we cannot put to use. The pressure on Great Britain is relieved and she is no longer under the necessity of sponsoring an international silver conference because she has accomplished the object of such a conference."

"The British pound sterling is going down, which is the same as saying that the money of the Chinese, the Indians and the Mexicans is going up in value, if it is used to purchase British goods."

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NEW PRIMATE GIVEN GREAT RECEPTION

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 1.—An ovation greeted Most Rev. Clare L. Worrell, Archbishop of Nova Scotia, on his return last night from Toronto, where he had been chosen Primate of the Church of England in Canada.

Straight Battle Between Labor & Nat. Government Predicted In Great Britain

Formal Dissolution Expected Immediately After Parliament Adjourns On Wednesday—New Parliament To Be Summoned 2 Weeks After Election.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—Another long day of conferences and Cabinet closed with dissolution of Parliament awaiting little more than formal proclamation, and the strong probability is the fight will be virtually a straight battle between the National Government—Prime Minister MacDonald heading Conservatives and Liberals—and the Labor Party.

Negotiations between the Conservative and Liberal wings of the Cabinet have not yet been completed. The Cabinet, its deliberations constantly interrupted by divisions in the House of Commons, sat until 11:30 p. m. and then adjourned to meet again tomorrow.

So far as can be judged in a situation which changes almost hourly the Liberal Cabinet Ministers who had threatened their resignation have decided to remain with the National Government, although there may be resignations of a few junior Liberal Ministers.

Formal dissolution is expected immediately after the Parliament adjourns next Wednesday. Polling will probably be on Oct. 23. The National Government expects to appeal to the country practically as it stands, and the new Parliament will be summoned two weeks after the election day.

Hindu-Moslem Trouble Feared

Progress Of Delegates To London Conference Is Halted By Dispute.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—A threat of Moslem unrest if the rights of the Moslems in India are not protected, when India is accorded federation status, was voiced by leading Indian Moslems to the members of the House of Commons and the House of Lords tonight.

Maulana Shaikat Ali, who served nine years in prison for anti-British activities, towering six feet six and weighing 300 pounds or more, was a striking figure in his Moslem robe as he predicted trouble if the Moslem demands are not met. "But," he said, "if you want friends, here is the hand of an honest man."

Up to that point the committee room in the House of Commons had been quiet as a church, but at his offer of peace the members cried, "hear, hear," and there was a great clapping of hands and stamping of feet.

Meanwhile the Hindu-Moslem communal dispute is holding up the progress of the round table delegates whose minorities committee adjourned today for another week to allow Mahatma Gandhi and the Aga Khan an opportunity to reach an agreement regarding the status of the Moslems under the projected federation.
