Miss Ethel McInnis left this week on return to Montreal after spending the summer here.

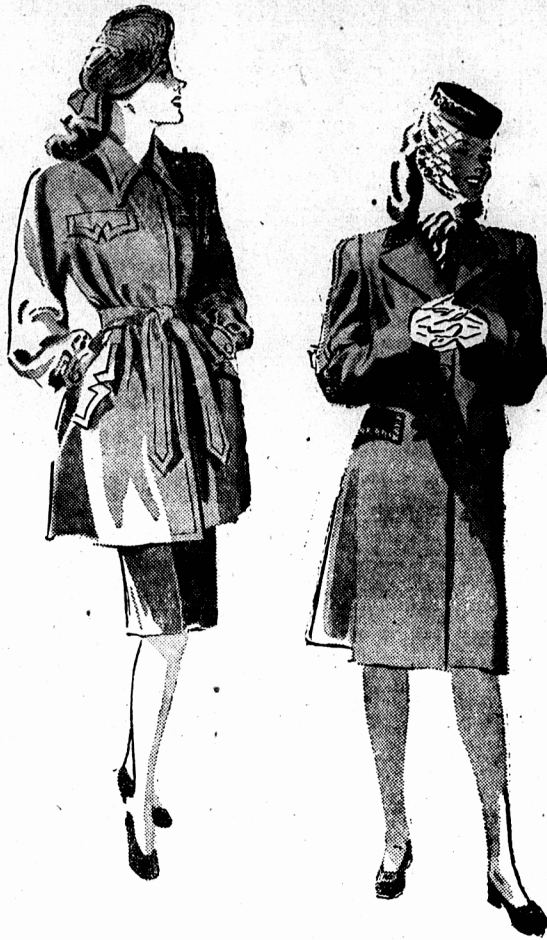

The annual meeting of the Hope River Credit Union was held on the evening of Oct. 27 with a good attendance of members. The president, Mr. Alphonse Dolron occupied the chair, and in his annual report outlined the activities of the organization during the past year, complimenting the officers who had voluntarily given their services in making the year a success. The treasurer's report, which was passed unanimously by the meeting, showed an increase in share capital of almost two-hundred per cent, with a paid-up dividend of 3 per cent on shares, 20 per cent of net profit was transferred to Guaranty Fund with 5 per cent to Educational Fund.

Reports were submitted by Mr. Wilfred McAleer of the Supervisory Committee showing books were audited quarterly and general audit made at end of year. He likewise told the members of the complete way that every detail of business was carefully fulfilled by the Treasurer.

Mr. Jas. McIssac reported for Credit Committee showing amount of loans made during the year. The membership drive was endorsed by the meeting, and a committee was appointed for that purpose.
