*HORSE NOTES.—M. F. McDonald, Montague, has sold his speedy green pacer, Longboat, to Mr James Gordon, New Perth. The boys will have to give way now.—E.

*FARMERS' MEETING.—A meeting of the Souris Branch of the Farmers' Institute was held on Saturday evening, March 5th. This meeting eclipsed any other so far held by this institute, both in respect to the number of farmers present and the amount of important business done, testifying to the deep interest that the farmers in this section of the country are taking in agricultural work. The President, Mr. Peter McIsaac occupied the chair; the minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. Mr. Deaghan, who at a previous meeting had been authorized to correspond concerning the purchase of a pure bred Ayrshire bull, addressed the meeting and explained the transaction which resulted in the purchase of a pure bred animal for the institute. The animal was purchased from Mr. Cairns, of Freetown, P. E. I. for the sum of eighty-five dollars. He is but two years old and weighs 740 lbs. His sire, a four year old last year, sold for \$150; his dam produces 5,500 pounds of milk annually; and he is expected to dispose of the bull by auction; that the fee to members be 75 cents and to outsiders one dollar; that the buyer should keep the bull three years and that the Institute would then get the first offer of buying him back; that certain restrictions be placed on the first year and that the restrictions hitherto placed on all other animals be taken off. It was moved and seconded and carried that the bull should be sold to a new member from Souris River, only that the minimum price be thirty five dollars; he was bought by Mr. William Whalen for the sum of thirty six dollars. The President then explained to the members that if they wished to secure more pure bred animals, they had but to form a club among themselves, and by paying one dollar each they could secure such stock from the Government for three years. It was decided to purchase two Perfection Separators. For this purpose two clubs were formed, one at Souris River, the other at Little Harbor. Each district is to be canvassed, the money collected and paid to the Secretary of the club of seeds. After considerable discussion on matters of minor importance, the meeting adjourned to meet at 7.30 sharp on Saturday, March 27th.—C.

MR. BARRETT.

GIVE WOMEN THE VOTE AND SECURE PEACE OF WORLD.

LONDON, March 4.—The International Woman's Suffrage Alliance will soon issue a circular pamphlet, advocating the enfranchisement of women as a step towards securing the world's peace when once the present struggle has been settled. This appeal and largely written by Mrs. Millicent Fawcett one of the most influential leaders of the British Suffrage party in Great Britain, will be translated into the various European languages and sent into all countries, belligerent and neutral, whose delegates may possibly attend the congress which will determine the terms on which this war will be settled.

Mrs. Fawcett considers that it will be of incalculable value to the cause of woman suffrage if such a congress will put itself on record as believing in equal suffrage as a valuable safeguard of permanent peace, just as the Congress of Vienna advocated for the same purpose the placing of political power in the hands of the people.

She explained to your correspondent her position and reasons for making this fresh appeal on behalf of her sex at this time.

"Kant," she said, "in his famous essay on 'Perpetual Peace,' relied on the assumption that it is dynasties and not the people who wage wars for aggression. An autocrat does not seriously risk his own person or property in war; it is his subjects who stand to suffer the most poignant and horrid horrors—those who win as well as those who lose. The Congress of Vienna one hundred years ago, as Professor Murray pointed out in a recent article in the Hibbard Journal, presentative institutions have heartily condemned such when they recognize and practice wrongs such as the slave trade.

"If the congress which met to settle the Napoleonic wars, and of which

the leading spirits were the Emperor of Austria, the Czar of Russia, the King of Prussia, Lord Castlereagh, and so forth, was capable of so much what may be left out and not been great peace congress? My hope is that it will again endorse the Kantian principle that to extend self-government and political power to women would enormously strengthen the forces which make for peace.

"There are twenty six countries affiliated to the International Women's Suffrage Alliance. If any fair proportion of these can charge the representatives of their own country at the congress to remember that there is no true democracy as long as half the people are left out and are destitute of every vestige of political power. 1915 will show a great and worthy advance over 1815."
