*FARMERS BUYING HORSES—Messrs McAdum Bros., Selkirk Station shipped in a car load of work horses for their customers which, on arrival, was readily taken up at prices from \$50 to \$125 each. Another car load is also being imported.

*SOME SAWING.—Mr. John A. McLeod, proprietor of the McLeod Mill, Southampton, Lot 41, sawed, this present season, four hundred and fifty thousand feet, superficial measure, of spruce and fir boards, and three thousand four hundred squares (thousands) shingles.

*ANNANDALE NOTES.—There is a great quantity of cabbage coming to village these days from Fortune and Rollo Bay shipping them in the schooner loading for Sydney. There was a fine crop here this fall.—Mr. John J. Campbell, Poplar Point, was at Hewlett's Mills on business on Tuesday.—Mr. Angus P. Walker, Launching, was in the Village on a business trip on Tuesday last. He reports the potatoes very small but sound in his section.—Mr. Cameron McDonald, returned on his fall work done. He is quite a hustler.—Mr. Calib Robertson is up at Poplar Point taking in a cargo for Mr. A. C. Myers. He is loading a vessel there for Sydney, C. B.—Mr. Paul Lawless, Durell, took a weak turn the other morning while going up to the Chapel. He was unconscious for a little while. At last account he was getting around again.—Mr. and Mrs. A. D. McDonald, Durell, have been visiting at Sturgeon.—The Red House cheese factory closed for the season on Tuesday after a very successful season.—It is reported that Mr. H. McDonald, the cheese-maker is going away to College.—Rev. Mr. Heron has disposed of his farm and is about to move.—Mr. A. E. Dingswell, Durell, was at the Village last week on a business trip.—Mr. Wm. Jenking and son, Big Run, were to Souris Monday.—Mr. F. Jenkins of Boston who came home recently with the remains of his wife for burial intends returning to Boston this week.—O.

*CARDIGAN ROAD.—Sergt. Wilson averaging four head a week. He under terms of the soldiers re-establishment. The price paid was \$4,500.—The potato crop along this road was pretty fair, some good, some bad. A few, as Mr. Harry Thompson, had an excellent crop.—The starch factory, like others throughout the country, closed down for lack of potatoes, but the market at St. Peters Bay is good, and large quantities are shipped every day by rail.—Mr. Lauchlin McKinnon, butcher, is doing a very large country butchering business this season averaging four head a week. He bought and butchered 115 head thus far this season paying on an average 17c a pound dressed weight, and about \$70 a head.—The old Vanderline Mills, saw and grist, is now under new and progressive ownership. Mr. John D. McLeod, an American, purchased the mills about a year ago, rebuilt and improved them. The new turbine installed is 60 h. p. at present "head" and cost \$1,000. Most of the sawing gear Mr. McLeod took with him from the States where he followed milling. The capacity of the saw mill is 10,000 feet per day. The shingle machine is American built, and is also of large capacity. In the grist mill a new "Smelters," the second of the kind on the Island, has been put in at the cost of \$1,000. Though not a "roller process," it turns out a fine quality of flour, and grinds very fast. These modern mills are felt to be a great boon to the community as well as an apparent source of profit to the enterprising proprietor. Mr. McLeod has also purchased the old Hayden property as well as another timber property at Mount Hope and on Monday and Tuesday last had the services of Mr. John Alfred McDonald, provincial Land Surveyor, and a number of hands retracing the property lines.—The school here like the hundred others, is still vacant.—Mr. R. J. McNeill is preparing to move to Charlottetown with his family to reside for the winter.
