

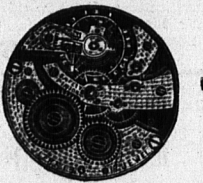

THE KILLED AND INJURED ON MINE-LAYER ALBATROSS.

BERLIN, July 5.—The German sailors of the mine-layer Albatross, who were killed in an engagement July 2 with a Russian cruiser squadron off the Swedish island of Gothland, were buried to-day with signal honours, in which Swedish authorities and civilians participated. Swedish troops came to salute as the procession wound its way from the shore, where the Albatross was beached, to the Bjoerke cemetery.

Revised estimates place the number of killed at thirty, and three more men are believed to be dying. Thirty other wounded sailors are now doing well.

MR. HUGHES EXPOSTULATES

Sir,—I am not at all surprised at the attack you made upon me in your issue of the 3rd inst. You seem to be inspired by a special and malignant hatred against me, which breaks out in violence from time to time, and for that I am to be congratulated. There they have a national Government in the best sense of the word, and while they may have made some mistakes, there was no intentional wrong doing. ment was spurned, and (4) the waste, the extravagance of the grant, the plunder thus revealed by a partial removal of the lid was sufficient to shock the country, and make honest men sick at heart. No wonder you cry out with pain when these things are mentioned, and run to cover behind Winston Churchill, but you would be far better employed if you assisted in the discovery of these misdeeds, and tried to prevent their repetition.

You say I am the only member of the House of Commons who at this time of national peril has held (5) party meetings. Have you forgotten that your friends, Messrs. McLean and Nicholson opened the ball in this Province, by a meeting at Bonshaw in which (6) they made such glaring mis-statements that they had to withdraw some of them, and can only claim that the others were substantially correct. Don't you know that the Solicitor General has held several meetings throughout Ontario and the West, at which he tried to make black appear white, and argued to the effect that the Tories were a privileged class, and not bound by the rules of conduct that apply to other men in time of war? And, only a few days ago, you published part of a bitter speech delivered at Durham, Ontario by Finance Minister White in which he is alleged to have accused the Grits. You surely remember that Hon. Robert Rogers held meetings in Montreal and elsewhere last spring, at which he cut loose, and "Bob" is no coining deuce when he gets started. How would it do for you to quote Winston Churchill to these men, and ask them not to disturb the peace at this time of national peril? When war broke out, Sir Wilfrid Laurier cancelled all his engagements, and publicly announced he was going to Ottawa (8) to place his services at the disposal of the Government. His generous and patriotic

offer was not however accepted. Sir Robert Borden appointed a Commission of Three men to expend the additional one hundred millions that had just been voted. In the appointment and in the personnel of this Commission, Sir Robert treated the Opposition in Parliament, and the Liberal Party in the country, as if they were aliens or enemies, and the object was quite apparent. (9) An official of the Militia Department swore before the Public Accounts Committee that they had Eight thousand names on the patronage list, and the man whose name was not on that list, had no chance to do business with the Department.

(10) You say that I have charged Sir Robert Borden with being privy to these things. I certainly have so charged him, and if he is possessed of ordinary intelligence, he must have been aware of them. But, all the same, it is not a question of what Sir Robert knows, he knows enough, we all know enough, but the question is, what steps has he taken to prevent a recurrence of the shameful transactions, which have disgraced the country? (11) My reply is, no adequate steps at all. He has not abolished, he had not the courage to abolish, the party color of the patronage list. He did not appoint a Commission fairly representative of the country, but he selected the strongest party men he could get.

(12) You say these things should not be mentioned because we are at war. (13) I have not charged Sir Robert Borden with disloyalty, but I would have times more reason for doing so than you or anybody else would have for making a similar charge against Sir Wilfrid Laurier. I am Sir, etc. J. J. HUGHES, Souris, P. E. I. July 5, 1915.

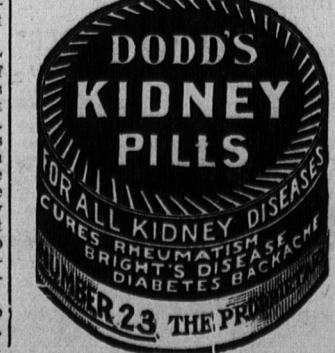
