CANADIAN EXPORTER IS STILL AGROUND

ASTORIA, Oregon, Aug. 4.—Efforts of tugs to pull the Government, the Canadian Exporter, into deep water, have been unsuccessful, according to despatch from Captain J. Bradley, of the Government vessel. The Exporter is from Astoria, Oregon, and is fast aground on a sandbar sixty miles amidships, both low and stern being in deep water.

The tug Wallula put out from Astoria yesterday and is standing by. The salvage ship Algerine, formerly a British cruiser, also left Victoria for the scene of the accident, and Captain W. B. Finlayson, marine superintendent of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, flew from Vancouver to Victoria by seaplane to join the Algerine rescue party.

The Canadian Exporter left Vancouver on Friday evening for Portland, Oregon, to complete her cargo for the Orient. She carried a mixed cargo, chiefly lumber.

Most of the crew are non-union men aboard for the first time. The Seaman's Union declined to recognize the reduced scale of wages now in effect on Government ships, and the old crew did not re-ship.

They were fast friends by the time they reached the garage and ran away to the Little Church Around the Corner soon after. Her mother died many years ago, but society folk in Baltimore still remember her and were shocked tonight to learn the manner of her death.

FRILLS POPULAR AT FRENCH CAPITAL

PARIS, Aug. 4.—The frill has come into its own again, and flutters gaily on smart frocks. It takes all kinds of liberties, absurd little groups appearing here and there upon a gown, or one long frill winds from hem to waist, spiral fashion. Capes are lavishly adorned in this way, and dresy parasols are seen covered entirely with frills. The mode is a convenient one for the renovator, for many a last year's frock or sunshade can be made to pass muster by means of this particular form of trimming. Parasols are providing many thrills. Quite recently a vivid yellow confection had a dragon painted thereon; a pink chiffon example exhibited clusters of black spiders, and a white silk muslin parasol had flights of bright green butterflies alighting all over it. All sizes and shapes are with us, from the absurd little toys only a few inches in diameter, to those resembling gigantic lamp shades.

STRAIGHT DEAL FOR POLES AND GERMANS

LONDON, Aug. 4.—Mr. Lloyd George in announcing in the House of Commons today the meeting of the Supreme Council in Paris on August 8, to adjudicate results of the Upper Silesian plebiscite, and the reports of the plebiscite commission, stated that the first item on the agenda would be to decide whether reinforcements were needed in the plebiscite area pending announcement of the adjudication on the whole plebiscite issue.

The Premier's announcement of the forthcoming meeting was greeted with cheers.

Mr. Lloyd George said that throughout the recent discussions with France, Great Britain had been guided solely by the desire to secure a just solution of the Upper Silesian issue in accordance with the result of the plebiscite.

A few minutes later in answer to a question, the Premier said: "It is the business of the British Government to see that the Poles and Germans alike get a perfectly straight deal."

The British Foreign Office today received a reply from Premier Briand, of France, accepting the proposal that the next meeting of the Allied Supreme Council be held in Paris Monday August 8, Premier Lloyd George, Lord Curzon, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and other of-

ficials of the Foreign Office will leave London on Sunday for the meeting. Premier Bonomi, of Italy, and Marquis Della Torretta, Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs also will be present.

The latest telegrams from Upper Silesia report the situation there as quiet. Lord Aberdeen, the British ambassador at Berlin, has been instructed to co-operate with his French and Italian colleagues in notifying Germany to hold herself in readiness to provide for the dispatch of Allied forces to Silesia across Germany.

The French authorities in Upper Silesia have let it be known that if any trouble develops from either the Poles or the Germans there the Allied forces will act together, and Germany has issued a proclamation warning all Germans in Silesia and on its borders to maintain absolute order.
