SANE MAN WAS IN A ASYLUM FOR EIGHTEEN YEARS

Finds a Listener, Who Hears His Story and Secures His Release

PROBIA III, Nov. 13--Repeatedly during his eighteen years confinement at the Kankakee insane asylum, Francis de Four has unsuccessfully tried to interest people in his case, and at last he found a man at his story.

De Four was a sailor who met with some mishap which caused him to be declared insane. Unable to talk English, he could give no account of his relatives. A few weeks ago he attracted the attention of a French Canadian patient and a watchman by the name of A. M. Pelletier. The latter suggested that De Four write to the parish priest.

THE RUSSIAN PARLIAMENT IS IN SESSION

Third Russian Duma Opened Yesterday With Patriotic Enthusiasm and Hearty Cheering For the Emperor--The City and the Students Quiet.

St. PETERSBURG, Nov. 14--(Special)--The third Russian Parliament was opened in the Tauride Palace at eleven o'clock this morning in presence of Premier Stolypin and the cabinet by M. Golebuff, Vice President of the Council of the Empire. The religious service preceding the opening was conducted by Metropolitan Antonius and a large number of bishops and other high ecclesiastics and was made the occasion of a great display of patriotic enthusiasm on the part of the conservative and moderate members. The National Hymn was repeatedly sung and the Emperor was vigorously cheered. The city is quiet. A few hundred students gathered in the vicinity of the palace, but they did not attempt to make any demonstration.

It is understood Collins has confessed to his spiritual adviser but it will not be given out until after the execution.

123 ST. PIERRE FISHERMEN LOST DURING SEASON

Seven of French Fleet Go Down With All on Board.

NORTH SYDNEY, November 13--The average catch of the St. Pierre fishing vessels for this season, which averaged 1,750 quintals, for each of the seventy-one schooners shows a marked increase over previous years, and restores business activity in every section of the French colony. Out of the vessels sailing out of St. Pierre, seven of them were lost, in which 123 souls were victims, the majority of whom left large families. The largest shipwreck and therefore the takers of the largest catch, were Morue Francaise company, who had twenty-two vessels, whose total catch amounted to 30,000 quintals. Five of their vessels were lost, with all on board. The Madeline, with twenty men, has never been heard of since leaving the French colony on her first trip. The total catch of the French fleet is over 120,000 quintals of fish, worth nearly \$800,000.

CALF HAD ONE ON THE TORONTO MEN IN BLUE

Story of Brave Policeman Who didn't Know Calf from deer

TORONTO, Nov. 13--"Let us catch him alive and present the beautiful creature to the Zoo," said two of Toronto's best known police officers as they scanned the Haliburton Valley for deer and espied one resting quietly "just as the sun went down." Cords were secured, and with the caution of sleuths the hunters approached the animal, and with a united bound seized and bandaged it, and, carrying it to the tent, left it till daylight should reveal its grace and beauty. Soundly slept the hunters, but just as daylight was breaking they were aroused with cries of "cattle-thieves," "robbers" and other epithets not heard in the chief's presence. Tumbling out of bed and into their muff, they rushed to the tent door, and there was former untying the supposed deer and uttering angry threats as to what he would do to the "cattle-thieves." The supposed deer was a year-old calf, and with the revelation vanished the dream of a fine deer for the Zoo. Instead the hunters had to settle with a very angry Haliburton farmer.

SIR CAMPBELL BANNERMAN SERIOUSLY ILL

Suddenly Seized With Heart Trouble After Addressing a Public Meeting; London Doctors Summoned, Is Now Out of Danger

BRISTOL, Eng. Nov. 14--(Special)--Premier Campbell Bannerman after addressing a political meeting was seized with sudden illness last night. Doctors attended the sufferer for over an hour and although the sharpness of the attack has ceased, the Premier's condition is such that London doctors have been summoned. Heart trouble is believed to be the cause of the illness. Sir Henry had planned to make several political speeches, but he has given up all his engagements and has requested Chief Secretary for Ireland Birrell to take them up. The Premier is tonight reported out of danger.

PENSION HAS BEEN GRANTED TO MAYOR DREYFUS

The Announcement Made Officially That He Will Receive \$470 a Year.

PARIS, Nov. 13--The announcement of the pensioning of Major Alfred Dreyfus was officially gazetted as follows: "Dreyfus, Alfred, chief of squadron (major), thirty years, ten months and two days service; pension from Aug. 25, 1907, 250 francs (\$470) a year." Dreyfus, having retired before completing two years' service as major, received only the pension of a captain.

Latest Figures Show Great Britain Ahead in Warship Tonnage

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13--The United States is second in the relative order of warship tonnage among the sea powers, according to a statement just issued by the office of naval intelligence, Navy Department. But she will yield second place to France when the ships now under construction by both countries are completed. Great Britain is still the leading sea power of the world and Japan is fifth. Great Britain leads in the number of first class battleships, having 52 while the United States has 22, France 19, Germany 22, and Japan 11.
