Work Provided On Vast Scale Under Federal Aid Plan

Says Total Given Work In Canada Is 151,000 Industry Speeds Up.

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—Senator Gordon Robertson, Minister of Labor, today published a report on the results obtained by the joint federal, provincial and municipal unemployment relief scheme and also a forecast of some of the works to be commenced in the future.

NEW CONTRACTS

Senator Robertson said the Canadian National Railway shortly would award the contract for a new station at Saint John, N. B., and for the grade separation scheme at London, Ont. Construction work will commence soon on La Canadiere subway, Quebec, on the Brantford Ont., cutoff and on the Port William, Ont., freight storage shed.

IN MARITIMES

New Brunswick figures likewise incomplete but showed 15,906 men had been afforded employment up to the end of November.

In Prince Edward Island, 654 men were given employment, but figures were lacking regarding direct relief.

Nova Scotia figures showed 26,662 men were given employment and the heads of 1,443 families were afforded direct relief.

WOMAN MEETS DEATH IN PECULIAR MANNER

CWEN SOUND, Jan. 16 When one of her small children ran into a chair on which she was standing yesterday Mrs. George McDougall, 30 of Warton, received injuries which resulted in her death.

BAD TEETH HARM EYES

TORONTO, Jan. 16, Persons undergoing an operation on the eye, contract for instance, take great risk of getting infection in the eyeball after the operation because of the condition of the teeth, says Pearson's Weekly.

An eye which has been out of, of course, more susceptible to infection than an eye which is intact. Therefore, surgeons insist that before an eye operation is undertaken the mouth, the nose and throat must be clean; that there shall be no sources of infection in the teeth, in the gums, in the tonsils or in the nose.

Dr. Adam Shortt, Economist, Dies In Ottawa

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—Dr. Adam Shortt, well known economist and former chairman of the Civil Service Commission, died at his home here today.

The death of Prof. Shortt came as a great surprise to his friends here. He had been in ill-health for some six months but his condition was not considered serious.

At the time of his death Prof. Shortt was chairman of the Dominion Board of Historical Publications, and was engaged by the Dominion Government in the important task of co-ordinating the historical facts of the Dominion of Canada.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by one son, Dr. George Shortt, of Montreal, and two daughters, Mrs. Roger Clarke, of Vineland, Ont., and Miss Lorraine Shortt, of Ottawa.

CIVIL SERVICE CHANGES AWAIT BEATTY REPORT

OTTAWA, Jan. 16, Whether there will be legislation this year in any way affecting the Civil Service Commission may depend upon the Beatty report, so it was stated by a high authority to-day, regarding rumors of enlargement or re-organization of that body.

The Beatty Commission is not to deal with the Civil Service Commission but rather with the salaries to be paid the Civil Service and whether or not the present scale should be revised upward. Nevertheless, the whole subject is more or less interrelated and one job likely would be made of the while thing if legislation is to be brought down.

Mystery Of Man's Death Is Unsolved

FALL RIVER, Mass., Jan. 16.—The death of George Landry, 38, native of Quebec, whose body was found Sunday night in a diving suit on the beach at Little Compton, R. I., has provided a weird mystery which local and Rhode Island state troopers have as yet failed to solve.

His wife told police that on Sunday afternoon a man named Levesque came to her home. He said that Landry was wanted at the Crowninshield Shipbuilding Company, Somerset, where he had been employed as a diver. They left and Mrs. Landry never saw her husband alive again.

Late that night William Denadal of Fall River said that he found Landry's body. It was encased in a diving suit, on the beach at Sakonnet Point, Little Compton. He rushed the body to a hospital where doctors said that death was caused by suffocation not drowning.

Denadal said that he had seen a second man in an apparently sinking dory offshore. Police think Landry might have been working on the bottom beneath the dory and an accident may have cut off the air supply.

Police investigation revealed that Landry had ten or more men as aides. Officially it is not known why he was diving at night, but authorities investigating report that a gang of rum runners was at work attempting to recover a valuable cargo of liquor jettisoned during a chase by Government officers.

GLENWOOD WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The second regular monthly meeting of Glenwood Women's Institute was held on the 6th inst at the home of Mrs. James Auld. The president, Mrs. Alfred Gorrill occupied the chair and Mrs. Albert Gorrill presided at the organ. The meeting opened with the Institute Ode followed by recitation of the creed in unison.
