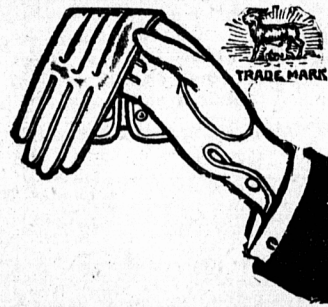

The remains of the late James L. The world's record for yearling pacers was reduced from 2.30 1/2 to 2.20 flat at Peoria, Ill., recently by the precocious colt, Manager H., by Manager (2.06), dam Nellie M. (2.10), by Butler's Bashaw (2.28). Manager (2.06), the sire of the new champion pacer, was at one time the champion pacer stallion. He is a son of Nutwood (2.1 1/2), and his dam was Carrie (2.29), the daughter of George Wilkes that also produced the granddam of Strong Boy (2.12) the sire of Dr. Strong (2.0 1/2), etc., so that Manager H. is bred to be a champion.
