KING REVIEWS 20,000 TROOPS

On Phoenix Park in Presence of Vast Multitudes

CONNAUGHT COMMANDING

Admiralty Gives Hurried Order for Four Cruisers—Trouble in Macedonia Causing Serious Concern in Europe.

KING ATTENDS A REVIEW.

DUBLIN, July 23.—(Special).—King Edward reviewed 15,000 troops to day and 5000 men of the Naval Brigade in Phoenix Park, where the ground was packed by tens of thousands of spectators. The Duke of Connaught commanded.

PRESENTATION OF COLORS.

The King was attended by the Lord Lieutenant, Earl of Dudley and a numerous suite.

The King presented colors to the Royal Hibernian Military School.

HASTY ORDER FOR CRUISERS.

GLASGOW, July 23.—(Special).—The British Admiralty has called for bids for four cruisers from the Clyde builders. Tenders close in ten days, the shortest time on record.

THE TROUBLE IN MACEDONIA.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 23.—(Special).—The increasing activity of the revolutionists in Macedonia and the difficulties encountered by the Turkish troops are producing an unpleasant effect in official quarters and apprehensions in diplomatic circles.

EUROPEAN SCHEME OF CONTROL.

HORSE RACES AT SUSSEX N. B.

A Big Crowd and Day of Splendid Sport

Rockfarm Grace Family Captured the 2-20 Trot and 2-25 Pace After Seven Hard Heats—One Event Unfinished

The midsummer races at Sussex track, on Wednesday were a huge success. The 2-20 trot and 2-25 pace was a brilliantly fought battle. After seven hotly contested heats Rockfarm Grace won out. Mr. Willis' brown stallion Lord Alverston got second money winning first place twice. His performance in the first heat when he finished a head in front of Fleetstep was the fastest of the meeting. He did the mile in 2:19 1/2. The other heats were considerably slower, due to the great number of miles driven and the great amount of scoring required each time.

The 2-25 trot and 2-23 pace was taken by Montrose, the Fredericton stallion. He drew the pole and was never headed. At the half George was close upon him as was also Kaiser G. Montrose won without difficulty with George second and Kaiser G. third. The time was 35, 1:10, 1:46, 2:23. George jumped to the front in the second heat, followed by Kaiser. For half a mile and more these positions were kept, Montrose being away in the rear and acting badly. Kaiser was the winner with Nena Wilkes second and George third. In the third heat Kaiser G led for half a mile with Montrose next. In the last quarter, however, Montrose went ahead and won with Kaiser second and Nena Wilkes third. Montrose led throughout the fourth heat, though Kaiser was a slight advantage and Kaiser was set back for running, which gave Nena Wilkes second in the heat.

SAME PLACE FOUR TIMES.

FIREMEN FELL FORTY FEET.

ST. THOMAS, July 20.—Wilbert Parker, aged thirty, who came here from King Lake a few weeks ago, entered the employment of the Lake Erie and Detroit Railway Company as fireman at six p. m. on Saturday. At midnight while the train was standing on Mill Creek Bridge he stepped off the engine and fell to the ravine below a distance of forty feet. He is still unconscious, and is believed to be fatally injured.

CUP DEFENDERS IN HARD LUCK

The Reliance and the Columbia Went Aground

The Constitution Was so Unfortunate as to Lose her Topmast in the Trial Race on Wednesday.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 22.—The last run of the New York Yacht Club cruise back from Vineyard Haven to-day, was almost as disappointing as that of yesterday, at least so far as the ninety-footers were concerned. Within a mile of the start the Reliance and Columbia struck bottom on the eastern end of the middle ground in the Vineyard Sound, and only a quick turn of the wheel saved Constitution. Reliance came off within two minutes, while Columbia, held on the shoal by a strong tide, stuck there for more than an hour, being finally assisted off, apparently uninjured, but of course out of the race. The other two boats kept on, but on getting out beyond Cay Head, a stiff puff of wind snapped off the topmast of Constitution. After the wreck had been cleared away she proceeded and crossed the line nearly three-quarters of an hour after Reliance.

The cruise ends with two wins to the credit of both Reliance and Constitution. A diver examined the fin of Reliance this afternoon, after her arrival in port but could discover no damage, so that she will probably be in the race tomorrow. Constitution procured a new topmast this afternoon, and will also start, but there seems to be some doubt about Columbia, although she arrived in port half an hour after Constitution, apparently uninjured.

C. P. R.'S BIG EARNINGS.

MONTREAL, July 21.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy today told your correspondent that the earnings of the C. P. R. for the month of June would exceed those of any railway on the continent. The increase was \$920,000 over any other month and \$200,000 better than that of the New York Central for the same month.

MAY VISIT THE PRESIDENT.

LONDON, July 21.—The Standard says: At Portsmouth it is reported that the cruiser King Alfred will, after the naval manoeuvres, be held in readiness to take the Prince and Princess of Wales to New York, they having accepted an invitation to visit President Roosevelt. There is no official confirmation of the report.
