Says Skilled Men Deprived of work At Pictou Yards
OTTAWA, July 21.—(CP)—Clarence Gillis (C.C.P., Cape Breton South) said today in the House of Commons that some 80 skilled men were out of work at the Pictou shipbuilding plant at Pictou, N. S., where work ceased on two partially-completed tugs for the government.
Mr. Gillis said he had given notice of his question to Munitions Minister Howe. Work on the tugs had ceased although 93 per cent of the material necessary to complete them was in the yard.
Mr. Gillis said Mr. Howe had explained that the partially-completed tugs were to be shipped to Montreal, along with the material for their completion, but this had not been done.
"The Minister's statement to the effect that the total expenditure there would be some \$60,000 for each tug was incorrect; the target cost
