Further Report Of Speeches At Big Convention

(Continued from page 5, against which no man or party could contend.

"I have demonstrated the truth of this, and today, in every particular, events have justified the MacMillan Government is fully vindicated in the failure of our successful election opponents to impudently any of their most important pledges, is one of the biggest contributions to the honor of the MacMillan administration.

"To consider those records in detail would take up time which I regret is not at our disposal, so that I must content myself with an expression of the very great pleasure I have in supporting this nomination.

Evening Meeting Speaking at Tuesday night's public meeting, Hon. Dr. MacMillan again acknowledged his appreciation of the signal honour conferred upon him, particularly in view of the democratic nature of the convention which represented every polling division in the province.

He reviewed briefly the events connected with the Coronation and the recognition of Canada's status as a nation.

He paid tribute to the benefits received by this Province from the Bennett Government, citing particularly the reduction in automobile taxes on the car ferry steamer, the construction highway, the Rustico-Hunter River highway, and the White Commission award.

The electors had been assured by Mr. Mackenzie King, he recalled, that as soon as there was a change of government Mr. King would call all the Liberal Premiers to Ottawa and there would be "honey in everybody." Those promises, he showed, had failed lamentably to materialize.

"Not a Mistake" "Just a few hours ago," said Dr. MacMillan, "when we were bowed in grief and in respect that splendid teacher who was buried today, the late Dr. Robertson a thought came to my mind when I saw his remains laid out there for the last time, for the inspection of those students whose ministrations he was not any great mistake that it was not a mistake to give to the sons and daughters of our people the advantage of a educational institution to which they were entitled" (Applause).

The speaker criticised the unfair Liberal criticism which had been levelled against him in connection with the building of this institution and Falconwood Hospital. He regretted that time did not permit him to go into the disgraceful episode of the Campbell Government's prohibition administration, "beginning with that fair blunder the Attorney General made when he abolished the Prohibition Commission, down to the recent astonishing 'investigation' in the provincial Building when Sec. 172 of the Act was invoked to enable the Attorney General to investigate his own administration."

"That," said the speaker amid loud applause, "was the most ridiculous expose of the administration of any Attorney General that has ever known in the history of Prince Edward Island."
