RED FLAG OF ANARCHY TERRORIZES RUSSIA.

The Kiaz Potemkine Has Hosts of Friends in the Russian Fleet and All Over the Czar's Domains—Neutral Powers May Enter the Black Sea.

LONDON, July 4.—Before fairly recovering from the first fright caused by the appearance of the mutinous battleship Kiaz Potemkine before the city with the red flag of anarchy flying from her stern, the city of Odessa has again been thrown into a panic by the appearance of the rebel battleship and her desperate crew, preceded by a threat to bombard the city and attack all Russian ships that refuse to hoist the red flag and join in the revolt against the government. The terror of the peaceful inhabitants of the city is not lessened by the assurance of the military and naval authorities that several torpedo boats with volunteer crews have set forth to attack and sink the Potemkine.

ALL SCURRYING FOR SHELTER.

Every Russian vessel in the Black Sea is now scurrying for shelter and the threats of the desperate crew of the Potemkine have created a worse reign of terror along its shores than did the first report of the mutiny. At this time there is some hope that Kruger's ships would specially come to the rescue and sink this floating menace to the safety of the coast, but now that it has become known that the spirit of mutiny and revolt has spread through the other vessels of the Russian fleet, relief is despair of. That the torpedo boats should be successful in their effort to sink the Potemkine is regarded as utterly improbable. It is recalled that on the night of her first appearance before Odessa, the crew of the Potemkine gave an exhibition of marksmanship that augurs ill for the safety of the torpedoers should they be sighted, by the vigilant mutineers.

THE PIRATES' GOOD SHOTS.

On that occasion while the battleship's searchlights were playing over the city, harbor and shipping, a group of Cossacks took shelter in the vicinity of the Richelieu monument in the middle of the Nicolai boulevard, in the heart of the city, whereupon a shell from the battleship was sent with unerring aim squarely into the middle of the group. The remembrance of this incident is anything but pleasant to the citizens of Odessa at the present juncture, and the reply of the St. Petersburg government to the rebel crew's demand for amnesty is anxiously awaited.

MUTINIOUS SPIRIT SPREADS.

The terrors of the situation are increased throughout the empire by the knowledge that the mutinous spirit has not been confined to the navy, but has spread to the sailors of the merchant marine as well. The first sign of this the refusal of the crew of the Or-

STRIKE OVER ALL EMPIRE.

The perplexities of the St. Petersburg government are added to by the increased activity of the revolutionary party, the leaders of which are endeavoring by every means in their power to foment the general revolution by means of a general strike of workmen all over the empire, beginning on Thursday. Circulars bearing this appeal have been circulated in all the leading manufacturing towns, and in the centres where trouble has already broken out, such as Lodz and Warsaw, efforts are being made to revive the struggle, with excellent prospects of success, some of the troops having been withdrawn by reason of the threatening state of affairs in St. Petersburg itself and at Libau and Cronstadt, where a general rising would be much more dangerous than in any other section of the empire.

FEARS OF NEUTRALITY.

Although the proclamation issued by the mutineers before leaving Kustendji, Roumania, held out assurances that all neutral shipping and property would be held sacred, considerable alarm is felt by all the nations having interests along the Black Sea that the rebels may, in their quest for food and supplies, attack them. To this it has already been reported that a German fishing settlement was attacked by the mutineers and a herd of cattle seized, but forty miles from Odessa. If this report be true there is some reason to believe that the career of the private ship will be brought to a sudden close by the sending of German warships into the Black Sea, with the consent of the signatory powers for the protection of German property in view of the powerlessness of the Russian government to adequately deal with the situation.

OBITUARY.

Again the voice of friendship bids us pay a tribute to the memory of the head, his time to that of Daniel A. Matheson, whose sad and unexpected death on the 9th. ult. sent two communities into universal mourning. For both in the community in which he was born and that in which he spent the last years of his life he was a favourite with all. A son of the late James Matheson of Upton from whom he inherited many of those splendid traits which made him respected and beloved, Mr. Matheson was a man who from his childhood shunned the follies which attract too many of our youths, choosing rather to work and study, and at an early age became a graduate of P. W. C. This advantage he made a stepping stone to higher flights of knowledge, seeming always to regard the words, "Get wisdom and with all thy getting get understanding." He taught school in several of our districts bringing to that profession the strong native energy which characterized all his doings for "whatsoever his hand found to do he did it with all his might." And while ardently attentive to secular affairs he also strove for the development of a strong Christian character, arising with him daily the tokens of divine intercourse, the Holy Scriptures being the mine into which he constantly dug for the jewels which adorned and enriched his life. Our dear friend is gone but his devotion to truth and right has left an influence which time cannot destroy, and we feel assured he now enjoys the reward of his faithfulness. We cannot close this sketch without referring to the clouds which shadowed his life. His mother died in his early childhood, and while still young his father died also, and a little later his only brother died of pneumonia in British Columbia. Shortly afterwards he sold the homestead and tried his fortune in the far west where he suffered the loss of his right arm. But even this did not seem to shake his indomitable courage. Coming back to his native province two years ago, he bought a farm at Millgill on which he carried on extensive farming operations until the sad accident which caused his death. He leaves to mourn four sisters, Sarah at home, Margaret in Cal., Bessie, (Mrs. Fred McLeod) in Boston, and Beattie teaching in Alberta. To those and to his many other near relatives and friends we offer our deepest sympathy. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor Rev. Mr. McKensie. They were unusually solemn and impressive; many will long remember the tender words of eulogy of the dead and counsel to the living which marked the solemnities.

"WEEKLY" CHANGED TO "TRI-WEEKLY"

The "Weekly Edition" of "The Charlottetown Guardian" was changed on July 1st to a "Tri-Weekly Edition." This was done because it is considered that the "Weekly" is too slow for a province with so many daily and tri-weekly papers as that of Prince Edward Island. In the past, four or eight papers have been printed on Friday, eight on Saturday or Monday, and these twelve or sixteen pages have been held until the following Wednesday when eight more have been printed and then the entire twenty or twenty-four pages have been mailed as one paper to all subscribers. Thus the news of about two thirds of the issue is so old as to be of very little value when it reaches its destination the week following its actual publication. Now each section is mailed on Monday, Wednesday and Friday as soon as off the press. All the news is thus fresh, and each section of ads. and reading matter much more likely to be read thoroughly than if the entire twenty to twenty-four pages arrived but once a week, and all at one time. All advertisements will appear in but one section of each entire week's issue as in the past, unless it is desired that they appear more frequently, in which case arrangements can be made with the management. Regular advertisers in the past have been required to have "changes" in not later than Saturday, and by the time the paper reached subscribers the following week it was often desirable that other goods arriving in the meantime be advertised. Under the three-a-week issue "changes" received up to either Tuesday, Thursday, or Saturday at ten p. m. will be printed in either the Wednesday, Friday or Monday issue respectively, and thus reach readers when new and fresh. Transient advertisements can appear either once, twice or three a week as arranged for. It is believed that all readers will appreciate the change, as they will in future receive a paper, issued each Monday, Wednesday and Friday of every week instead of twenty to twenty-four pages issued but Wednesday of each week. Advertisers very much prefer that their ads appear but once a week in a tri-weekly rather than in a Weekly of two or three times the size, as they are much more likely to be read carefully.
