A point that has been much controverted during the discussion on reciprocity is, How can the producer and the consumer both be the gainers by free trade in food products?

country to the other. We have taken butter as an example, but the same rule will apply to hay, oats, potatoes, meats, cheese, eggs, poultry and so forth.

Now let us suppose that a fifty pound package of butter is imported from Charlottetown by a grocer in Boston, the price here being 25 cents per pound.

Prince Edward Island produces a surplus of butter, cheese, potatoes, oats and other articles. The manufacturing population of New England have to buy these things where they can.

The point is that the duty, \$3 in one case and \$2 in the other must be paid by the last purchaser and consumer, or by the producer.

But, as in the case of eggs which we cited the other day, or in the case of early berries, before our native berries are ripe, it will be an advantage to consumers here to have the tax taken off, and it will not in any way injure our producers of eggs or berries, who have them none to sell.

CLEVEREST SWINDLER IS CAPTURED

Potter Has Made \$1,500,000 by Gold Brick Schemes

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—S. A. Potter, who is said to have garnered more than \$1,500,000 from the unwary of two continents during the last few years by means of gold brick swindles and confidence games, was locked in jail here tonight.

He was arrested here today by G. F. De Woody, division superintendent of the Department of Justice, after being sought for a year by United States secret service men and the police of nearly every city in the country.

English detectives of Scotland Yard also are said to have sought Potter and his companions, who were credited with having extracted numerous dollars from too credulous Londoners.

KNOWN AS GEO. W. POST.

Potter, who was also known as George W. Post, was wanted here on an indictment for swindling, returned in the United States Court in July, 1910. Potter and a companion, Edward Starkloff, also are wanted in Philadelphia where they forfeited a \$23,000 bond in the United States Court a year ago.

In view of the forfeiture and the report that the confidence men, of whom Potter is said to be the head, continually kept a large amount of protection money within reach, Chief De Woody will make every effort to keep the prisoner under lock and key until he is brought to trial. A cash bond of \$50,000 offered by Potter was refused by federal officials, who declared that nothing less than \$150,000 cash bond would gain him his temporary freedom.

Starkloff, who is said to have operated with Potter under a score of names, is in the city, according to De Woody, and all of the secret service men and police here are searching for him.

FIND "SUCKER" LIST

At Potter's home a great quantity of evidence was found, including what the secret service men termed a "sucker list" of former and prospective victims. The list is said to contain a greater number of names of residents of cities than of rural inhabitants.

After fleeing his \$23,000 bond in Philadelphia, Potter and Starkloff are said to have opened an office here and to have flooded the Middle West with advertisements of spurious money for sale at half-price. The bill, it was declared, was made from plates stolen from the United States mint at Philadelphia and were splendid counterfeits. The investor usually received a package of blank papers, and being in the position of having sought to defraud the government, he would not dare to complain to the authorities.

CLEVEREST IN THE WORLD

Chief De Woody said tonight that it was likely the prisoner would be taken to Philadelphia for trial instead of facing here a charge of mail fraud. It is believed there is more evidence in the Philadelphia case and a greater penalty could be imposed there.

Chief De Woody said: "Potter is the cleverest confidence man in the world, in my opinion. He and his companions have obtained \$1,500,000 in a few years by means of the green goods, salted gold mine and gold brick swindles. They are known to the police of every big city. We have been after Potter and his companions for several years, but found no trace of them until several days ago."
