# Canada Retains Trade Channels

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—Canada is not handicapped through agreements reached by the Imperial Economic Conference in reaching preferential trade agreements with the United States, it was announced here today by one high in the confidence of the Government.

In opposition to the agreements emphasis has been placed upon the possibility that a Democratic victory in the United States in November would open the way to mutually beneficial trade agreements with that country, but that such a course was blocked by the Empire Conference pact.

That view was flatly refuted today. The undertaking with the Empire is that the margin of preference shall not be reduced. The Canadian tariff provides three levels, the British preference, the intermediate and the general schedule.

The United States and most other foreign countries are on the general schedules which range from 20 per cent to 100 per cent over the intermediate levels. Factually there is nothing in the Empire agreements to preclude Canada entering into agreements with the United States or those other countries that would give them the benefit of the intermediate tariffs.

### Keep Spirit Intact

It is made clear that Canada has no intention of destroying the spirit of the Empire agreements, nor their value, by any agreement that would enable foreign countries to reclaim the definite margin of the Canadian industrial market the Empire pacts were designed to transfer to the United Kingdom, or to other sections of the Empire.

The situation, however, is that the Empire agreements cover only 223 items of the Canadian tariff. Close to 1,000 more are unaffected and these represent much more than half of Canada's normal import made. They may all be utilized for the purpose of encouraging trade with foreign powers.

In government circles, grave doubts are entertained that even a Democratic success in the United States next month will lead to concessions by that country that would admit Canadian natural products on any basis of fair competition with domestic produce.

Insisting there remains ample fields for negotiations to mutual benefit, should the United States desire to negotiate, the government has no disposition to "yield the substance of the conference work for the nebulous shadow of election uncertainties."

**DEATH DISSOLVES Link With Canada**  
LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Dowager Marchioness of Lansdowne, widow of the fifth Marquess of Lansdowne who was Governor-General of Canada from 1883 to 1888 is dead here.

The Marchioness, who was Lady Maude Evelyn Hamilton, daughter of the first Duke of Abercorn, married the Marquess in 1869. Following their term at Rideau Hall in Ottawa the Marquess and Marchioness went to India, remaining as Viceroy and Vicereine from 1888 till 1894. On their return to England the Marquess became Secretary of State for War in 1895 and retained the office for five years. From 1900 to 1905 he was Foreign Secretary. He did not hold a cabinet post again until 1915 when he was appointed a minister without portfolio in the war-time Government headed by Lord Asquith. The following year the Liberal Government of Lloyd George came into power. He died in 1927.

The Dowager Marchioness was Dame Grand Cross of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. In addition she held for two long periods honorary titles connected with the Royal household. From 1905 to 1909 she was Lady of the Bedchamber to Queen Alexandra, and extra Lady of the Bedchamber from 1910 to 1925. She had two sons, Henry William Edmund, the present Marquess, and Charles George Mercer Naime, one-time a de-de-camp to Lord Roberts in the South African war, who was killed in action during the first year of the Great War.

It was the Admiralty's desire to place certain guns in new ships, which could be used for high angle fire against aircraft as well as for ordinary purposes which led to the proposal by the treasury department. It was felt at the time money should not be spent on something which was known to be imperfect and which would likely have to be scrapped when further experimental work led to better designs. The Nelson is of 33,500 tons standard displacement and the Rodney of 33,900. Both are equipped with nine 16-inch guns, 12 6-inch, six 4.7 inch anti-aircraft guns in addition to other anti-aircraft guns and other armament.

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## Families Halved

NORTON, Mass., October 25.—Wheaton College students today learned that the average number of children in a family had decreased a most one-half in two generations. The girls, taking a course called "The Family" in the sociology department had written home to find out how many brothers and sisters their grandparents had in order to compile statistics on the change in the birth rate.

The girls discovered from the grandparent information that the average family at that time contained four and nine tenths children while their own families averaged two and one-half offsprings. The lost balance may be restored if the girls have their way as they agreed that the perfect family needed four children.

## Cycling Is Good For The Aged

Further striking testimony to the health-giving qualities of cycling comes from New Zealand.

Mr. Charles Barwell, a frail little man of 126 lbs. and now in his 70th year, spends the winters of his retirement struggling against poor health, but gains a new lease of life every spring as soon as he takes to the road again on a touring cycle with portable equipment of his own invention. His outfit is amphibious, for the collapsible tent which forms his shelter at night is convertible into a boat whenever he strikes river or lake.

So seaworthy is this portable boat that he often ventures to sea in it and has even made several attempts to cross the Cook Straits—one of the most wicked stretches of water in the world—dividing the North and South Islands of New Zealand.

In this romantic manner he leads a nomad life touring beautiful New Zealand from spring till autumn, penetrating wherever there is a road, a track or a navigable stretch of water. He keeps exploring and discovering, but his greatest discovery is this—told in his own words:

"After a winter at home, I generally start off on my tours with at least one fatal disease and half a dozen minor ailments. Within a week my fatal disease is cured and all my minor ailments dropped by the wayside. In my opinion, cycle riding is a luxury for the young but a necessity for the old, if they desire to keep fit."

Throughout the world there must be thousands who can endorse this philosophy.

## Santa Turns To Realism For Christmas Toys

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Santa Claus, 1932 style, is going to look like a salesman of labor saving machinery for a Lilliputian kingdom this year. The fall showings of new toys and games feature a complete array of miniature gadgets that actually perform tasks adults rate as dudery.

Among the new 1932 Christmas high lights will be tiny electric washing machines. There are vacuum cleaners and ice boxes equipped for practical service. Doll houses have plumbing facilities and electric lights. Children's furniture and even the smallest doll house furnishings are styled in period lines.

Carpentry and gardening tools designed for utility are great favorites with the nursery set. Even playing school has been styled on a strictly academic basis, with large blackboards, desks, globes and maps for realistic color.

Embryo printers can print their own newspapers on presses that reproduce every detail of adult models. Moving picture cameras and

projectors now are offered in the lower price ranges so that 1932 youngsters can get camera wise too. Electric trains now have signal stations that exactly reproduce the set-up at Grand Central Station. One elaborate railway system includes a whole terminal with electric lights, baggage shoots, information desk, ticket booths, train switches, etc. Toy airplanes now fly through the air. Although their propeller airplanes and the hum of their motors are authentic, they do not carry passengers.
