ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The Princess arrived last night at ten minutes to nine and the train at half past nine.

The funeral of the late James E. McDonald will take place at ten o'clock Monday morning.

W. C. TURNER will lead the men's meeting in the Y. M. C. A. parlor, Sunday at four o'clock.

S. S. Coban is due here this evening from Montreal, and sails Monday at noon for St. John's Newfoundland via Sydney and North Sydney, C. B.

At the Central Christian Church, Lord's Day, the following topics will be discussed: In the morning "What do ye more than others," in the evening, "The song of Moses and the Lamb."

The whaleback barge Mabel, in tow of S. S. D. Uglash H. Thomas is due to arrive here this afternoon from Louisburg, C. B. with a full cargo of Reserve Run of Mine coal to Peake Bros. & Co.

At Sauris on Thursday before Stipendiary Blanchard J. D. McCormack, B. G. McLellan, E. McDonald and R. F. McDonald were each fined \$30 and costs for violation of the Scott Act.
