**WOOL WOOL**

Sheep Raisers, remember that all wool must be purchased on grade this year. This is the system that has been successfully applied for some years, by the P. E. I. Sheep Breeders' Association, marketing through the Canadian Cooperative Wool Growers, Limited, Toronto. Ship your wool, or deliver, to the Sheep Breeders' Association, Agricultural Hall, Charlottetown. This is the only official grading station established in the Province, and with the exception of two woollen mills, all wool sold must go through this station for grading. All wool sold must be tagged with the owner's name and address, and if raw wool, each fleece must be separately rolled and tied with paper twine or woollen yarn. Do not use any other string. Ship to the Sheep Breeders' Association, and receive the highest market price and prompt payment on delivery.

### Summerside Ready to greet Victory Torch

Arrangements have been completed for the ceremonies at Summerside which will take place upon the arrival of the Victory Torch on Wednesday morning. The Victory Torch will arrive at the Summerside airport at 8.30 a. m. standard time. The ceremonies will commence at 9 o'clock sharp at Memorial Square. Mayor Campbell, who will act as chairman, will give a brief address on the significance of the Torch. Rev. C. W. Cook, pastor of the Summerside Baptist Church will give the prayer for victory while Rev. Messrs. G. J. MacLellan, Vicar General of the Roman Catholic Church will give the address. The Summerside girls band, Light Horse band from Charlottetown and the R. C. A. F. band will march in the parade and assist with the music. The Air Force choir and orchestra will be on the grandstand and lead the singing.

Mayors of Alberton, Kensington and Borden will also be present at the ceremonies. There will be a parade after the ceremonies, the Torch forming part. Decorated cars will be in the procession, besides military units, fraternal organizations. Summerside school children will march in the parade which will lead out of the square into Spring St. and proceed north to Green St., down Central to Water St. At the Clifton Hotel the Victory Torch will leave the procession, which will continue along Water St. turning up Summerside St. under the Victory Arch to the Town Hall. The bomber carrying the Torch will leave Summerside in time to arrive in Halifax at noon Wednesday. L-523-6-16-21.

### Flight Command At Capitol Theatre

"Flight Command" takes Robert Taylor, Ruth Hussey and Walter Pidgeon through a whirl of dramatic episodes on land and in the clouds in a rapid-fire blend of emotions, laughs and thrills. The spectacular new picture, filmed with the aid of the U. S. Navy, opened yesterday on the Capitol screen. It is the story of Alan Drake, Pensacola flying cadet, who joins a crack naval air force squadron. Taylor reveals the excitement of dive-bombing, parachute jumping, forced crash landings, and other thrills of the air. He figures in a triangle with his superior officer and the latter's wife. Wrongly suspected, he is about to be forced from the navy until, after a sensational rescue at sea during maneuvers, the truth emerges to clear him and retain him with loyalty to his squadron.

Taylor reveals his forceful performance of "Escape" and "Waterloo Bridge". Pidgeon is compelling as the squadron commander, and Miss Hussey plumbs dramatic emotions grimly. Frank Borzage's skilful direction is at home both in the aviation sequences (he is himself a flyer) and in the delicate human moments for which he is celebrated. Hal Rosson contributed beautiful photography, and the aerial thrills filmed from stunt planes, are breath-taking.

MONTREAL, Que., June 16—(CP)—Hymen, son of Apollo, the god of marriage, always designed as a winged youth, must have appreciated the wings of trans-Canada Air Lines which carried a ring from Montreal to Toronto in ample time for a wedding ceremony. Contributory aides were men of the Canadian National Express who took charge of the precious consignment from a local jeweller to final destination for delivery there to the hands of the anxious best man.

It had been arranged that a wedding guest should take the ring with her on the day train Friday, but finding the ring was not ready, she appealed for assistance to Harry Whitman, terminal agent, C. N. Express. She informed that a leading airman, in training at the Malton airport, was due to be married on Saturday and that she had been entrusted with the safe delivery of the ring. He advised her to take the train as planned and he would look after the ring.

Mr. Whitman personally went to the jeweller, secured the all-important wedding ring, rushed to St. Hubert airport, and put the package on T.C.A.'s afternoon plane for Toronto. Entering into the spirit of the occasion C. N. express officials in Toronto had the best man on hand to receive his precious charge and the wedding took place as arranged.

### New Axis Schemes To Incite Arabs

ANKARA, June 16—(CP)—New German and Italian schemes for inciting the Arabs against British authority in the Middle East to counteract strategic reverses of the axis in Iraq and Syria were reported today.

The Italian minister to Iraq, Meloni, who was ordered from Baghdad by the pro-British Iraq government, arrived in Ankara by plane and had expected to continue to Rome, but he now has been assigned to Teheran, capital of Iran (Persia), as "observer" with the fugitive Rashid Ali Al Ghalibani, the pro-axis former premier of Iraq who fled when British authorities took control.

### Livestock

MONTREAL, June 16—(CP)—Cattle were about steady on Montreal livestock markets today. Veal calves were steady, other kinds of calves 25 to 50 cents lower and hogs steady to 25 cents higher. Receipts: cattle 267, calves 2,939, sheep 622, hogs 1,000.

Good steers were mostly \$8.75 to \$9 with a few carloads selling up to \$9.25. Medium kinds were \$7.50 to \$8.50 with commoner steers from \$6 up. Heifers ranged from \$5 to \$8.50. Butcher cows were \$5 to \$7.50. Good cows \$6.75 to \$7.25 with a few tops up to \$7.50. Medium cows were \$6 to \$6.50 and common butchers mostly \$5 to \$5.50. Calves and cutters were \$3.50 to \$4.75 mostly \$4 to \$4.50. Good butcher bulls were \$6.75 to \$7.25 and commoner kind from \$5 to \$6.50.

Veal calves were about steady. Other kinds of calves were 25 to 50 cents lower. About 88 per cent of the calves offered were from the Maritime and Quebec Provinces and the bulk of those were common to just fair quality drinkers. Veals ranged from \$7.50 to \$11. Good veals were mostly \$10 with about half dozen tops up to \$11, medium \$9 to \$9.50, and commoner veals mostly \$8 to \$8.50. Drinkers were \$7 mostly \$6 to \$6.50.

Good lambs were mostly \$13 with one lot selling up \$13.50. Medium to good lambs in mixed lots brought \$12.50 and commoner kinds \$10 to \$11. Sheep from \$3.50 to \$6.50 with fair to good sheep in mixed lots selling mostly at \$6.

Hogs were steady to 25 cents higher selling at \$13.75 to \$14 for B-1 dressed, \$10.25 to \$10.50 mostly \$10.50 for B-1 alive fed and watered and up to \$10.75 of trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$6.50 to \$8.50 live weight.
