Prince Co. Member Moves Resolution Re Monetary Exchange

(Canadian Press)
 OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 16—Questions of currency were introduced in the House of Commons by Alfred E. MacLean, (Lib., Prince) who sponsored a resolution calling upon the Government to introduce at the Ottawa Imperial Conference the subject of monetary stabilization. The U. F. A. group moved an amendment which would instruct the Canadian delegation at the conference to press for the "stabilization of the currencies of all Empire countries on bases other than gold." The debate was not concluded and will be continued later in the session by H. E. Spencer, U. F. A., Battle River.

The government, said E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, was willing to introduce at the Conference any subject in which the Empire as a whole was interested. In that light, the MacLean motion was acceptable to the ministry.

His reason for moving the motion, said Mr. MacLean, was the detrimental effect adverse exchange was exerting on Canada's trade. It had nothing to do with the gold standard or the individual monetary systems of the Empire. If the Empire established a stabilized currency it would be in an enhanced commercial position. For 18 years Great Britain and Egypt accepted each other's currencies at par and the Prince Edward Islander believed great advantage would accrue if this agreement were extended throughout the Empire.

Bennett Welcomes Changed Attitude of Lib. Leader

 OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 16—The government is not in a position to advise the House of Commons in respect to the agenda of the Imperial Economic Conference, to be held in Ottawa next July, and it is possible that the agenda may not be available during the session. This was the information given to Mr. Mackenzie King, Opposition leader by Premier Bennett today.

The Opposition leader asked for information about the agenda because his colleagues were anxious to expedite the business of the House and to assist in the preparations for the Conference.

Mr. Bennett indicated that the agenda of the conference was necessarily a matter of discussion and negotiation between Governments of the Empire. He expressed appreciation of the helpful attitude indicated by the Opposition, remarking that he hoped this attitude would continue. Most of the cooperation received thus far, he said, had consisted in attacks on the Government in respect to the Conference. He was unable to say whether or not the agenda would be available, except in the general way.
