Expect Borden Strike To End This Morning

It is expected that the strike of labourers and carpenters employed by the Foundation Maritime Ltd., at Borden will be over this morning. According to Mr. M. J. Burns, office manager, the strike began to peter out yesterday as some of the carpenters and masons of the labourers returned to the job after the offer of a ten-hour day instead of the eight hours previously worked. Actually six carpenters were working at closing time last evening.

The men are being paid at the rate of 50 cents an hour for labourers and 70 cents for carpenters and they were demanding an increase of 15 cents an hour. This was refused by the company who offered instead a ten-hour day which would increase their total company bank houses are paying \$10.50 a week board.

They walked off the job on Tuesday morning and the company offer was given on Wednesday night. Rather than return to work at the old rate some of the men have left Borden to seek work elsewhere. These will be replaced.

Mr. Burns said that the need for ordinary labourers will not be so great from now on as the living quarters near completion. The company is engaged on a Government contract for the reconstruction of the piers but the men on strike were building mess halls and bunk houses.

Mr. R. J. Griesbach, superintendent of the company arrived in Borden Wednesday and conducted the negotiations.—S.

Boy Is Convicted Of Manslaughter

DORCHESTER, N. B., June 26—(CP)—In a ruling unique in the annals of the Westmorland Circuit Court, Mr. Justice J. E. Michaud today ordered a 14-year-old boy convicted of manslaughter to be held in the county jail until August 20, when he will be released in the custody of his mother.

The Judge's ruling marked the close of a case in which Francis Gautreau, 14, had been found guilty of manslaughter in the death of Reginald Dolron, four son of Mr. and Mrs. Henri Dolron of Barachois, N. B.

A jury deliberated four hours in bringing in a verdict of guilty. In reply to a plea by defence counsel, E. R. McDonald for a suspended sentence, Mr. Justice Michaud said this would not be possible.

He then ordered that the Gautreau boy be confined to the county jail for two months, after which he would be placed in the charge of his mother, who was instructed by the court to see that the boy attended school regularly and be given the environment of a proper home.

Evidence at the trial was that Gautreau shot the Dolron boy with a shotgun, inflicting injuries which caused instant death. The Gautreau boy had been at the Dolron home the day of the shooting with his mother, who had been employed to do housework for the Dolrons.

Enrolled For Term, Stayed For 40 Years

NEW YORK, June 26—(CP)—Isabel Stewart enrolled for a single term at the nursing school at Columbia University's Teachers College. The "term" lasted 40 years and the pupil wound up as the head of the school.

"It's been quite a term," chuckled the one-time Winnipegger, who tomorrow ends her tenure.

Miss Stewart, who wore a chic black suit and black straw hat, waved a hand around the room.

In an interview, she said "the only real hobby I've got is travelling and now that word, I'm going to travel some more, keep in touch with nursing developments in different countries and enjoy a little more leisure than I've had."

It was in 1907 that Miss Stewart, a young nurse fresh from Winnipeg General Hospital and a summer trip to Britain, landed in New York with enough money left for one term at the nursing school where many Canadian nurses have taken extra training. It was going to be a stay of one term.

But with the end of that academic session the bright-eyed little nurse was appointed assistant to the head of the school—also a Canadian—and in 1925 she succeeded to the top post when her superior, Dr. Adelaide Nutting of Waterloo, Que., and Ottawa retired.

When the New York Business and Professional Women's Club instituted its annual poll of 10 most outstanding women, Miss Stewart was on it. She is the author of "The Education of Nurses," published two years ago, and of many pamphlets on nursing and training methods.

34 Amendments To Criminal Code Proposed

OTTAWA, June 26—(CP)—The Commons today gave first reading to a bill making 34 amendments to the Criminal Code and providing authority to have habitual criminals sentenced to indeterminate periods of detention.

This section would apply to criminals 18 years and over who have been convicted three times on indictable offences and sentenced to terms of imprisonment of not less than five years on each occasion.

Justice Minister Halsey said this section of the legislation was similar to that now in force in the United Kingdom.

He said no one would be charged with a habitual criminal without the consent of the Attorney General of the Province where the accused resides.

The bill would permit habitual criminals to be confined apart from other prisoners and subjected to such disciplinary and reformatory treatment as might be prescribed by prison regulations.

Every three years the Minister of Justice would review the condition, history and circumstances of the person undergoing preventive detention and determine whether the person should be released on parole.

Another amendment would increase from one to three years the penalty for operation of common bawdy houses. A new section would provide penalties for any one working in the interests of a bawdy-house. The penalties would be a \$200 fine or 12 months imprisonment, or both fine and imprisonment.

The penalty for hit-and-run drivers likewise would be increased.

A section of the Code would be amended to make it an offence to carry an imitation of an offensive weapon.

Bodies Of Airmen Found In Labrador

GOOSE BAY, Labrador, June 26—(CP)—The bodies of three United States Army airmen who were lost in a crash more than three months ago were located by a search party today near Double Mer Lake, in the Labrador solitude 70 miles north of here.

A Catalina flying boat took off to return the searchers to this United States-Canada airbase, but it was believed the bodies would be buried near the scene of the crash which occurred March 13.

It could not be learned immediately whether the three had died in the crash or had perished later from exposure.
