EXCELLENT SPEECH BY MR. G. D. POPE, M. L. A.

During the last four years the Conservative Government has given you good service and I return them to power. Just where I would like to refer to the Liberal Meeting held in this Hall on the 29th May last.

Mr. John MacNeill stated that the Stewart Government had done nothing that would justify their return to power. Well Ladies and Gentlemen he must have been thinking of the Bell Government of which he was a supporter in the House of Assembly.

Mr. Lucas Allen denounced the Government for making a political issue of the Temperance Question. Well Ladies and Gentlemen the Old British system is to appeal direct to the People on any big issue which confronts the Government.

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Title Wrestling Bout Cancelled

CHICAGO, June 8.—Professional wrestling was down on the mat today under a cloud of charges that may end its career in this state. Shooting assertions of crookedness, fakes, and flop, witnesses before the state legislative investigation committee in a five hour session yesterday were answered both from the stand and the floor in denials equally as loud while promoters, managers and wrestlers called each other hard names. No evidence was adduced, however, to show that any fake matches had been staged since the Illinois Athletic Commission took Charge of wrestling last November. A threat to introduce a repeal of the law legalizing the mat game was the legislative committee's contribution to the uproarious session. Another and quicker result was the cancellation of the heavyweight wrestling championship match between Ed "Strangler" Lewis and Joe Malcewicz, scheduled for the State Park here next Friday night. Jim Mullen, the promoter, said he would have nothing further to do with wrestling until the charges could be disproved, if that can be done. The State Committee returned to the Legislature at Springfield today, and announced the next session of the Boxing-Wrestling investigation for next Monday.

amount that Summerside felt they were entitled to. When the Department at Ottawa made their final audit the balance due this Province was only \$15,156.10, and in allocating this amount to the various Projects on which work was done last year the Audit Department at Ottawa allowed Summerside only \$12,315.89, the balance being distributed among the various other Projects.

I am enclosing a copy of this audit so that you may understand the full amount of the 40 per cent. This you will bear in mind, is not the audit made by our Department, but by the Federal Department at Ottawa.

I have mentioned that Summerside expected to receive \$13,161.84, and the Federal Government allocated only \$12,315.89. When this matter was brought to your attention, you and Mr. MacNeill made strong representations to me on behalf of Summerside and myself. I feel that Summerside should only pay the full amount of the 40 per cent on the approved estimate, and Summerside accordingly was paid the full 40 per cent which is all they ever expected to receive and \$845.86 more than the Federal Government allowed Summerside in its audit.

I trust that I have made this matter clear to you. You will see that there is absolutely no truth in the statement made by Mr. Saunders in this connection. Both yourself and Mr. MacNeill were most active in looking after Summerside in this connection, and in every other connection since I have had control of this Department. It is difficult to understand any person making such a statement as Mr. Saunders made without any facts whatever to substantiate his assertion. Of course we have become accustomed to statements of this sort from Mr. Saunders, statements made entirely without regard for facts. I am sure the public knows of his propensity to make statements of this kind, and discounts his utterances accordingly. But, should any responsible person repeat this statement during the campaign you will know that it is absolutely without foundation, and you can deal with it accordingly.

AMATEUR GO FERS SHOW THE WAY IN QUALIFYING ROUNDS

Simon Pure Players Show Best Scores In Tests For National Open-Canadian In Field.

CHICAGO, June 8.—Not only first 31 in last year's tournament. does an amateur hold the National open golf championship but more than a dozen others stood qualified or withdrew after qualifying to compete for the crown now won by Bobby Jones of Atlanta, Ga., as a result of yesterday's 17 regional qualifying meets throughout the country.

In one meet, the low score was returned by a Simon-pure, James Marlon, getting the van position at St. Louis, with 146 among eight survivors. He withdrew later as did four at Pittsburgh. In the Chicago contest, Frank Thompson, formerly Canadian amateur champion, barely missed topping the field of 115 players; and, despite three puts on the final green, tied for third place. In addition to Jones, several other leading amateurs were relieved of qualifying for being among the day.
