MONTREAL, Oct. 10.—The Star's London cable says: One dealer quotes Welsh anthracite to-day at 28 to 30 shillings (\$6.92) to (\$7.00) a ton F. O. Resolution of Sympathy to Mr. Duncan

MORE LIGHT FOR STREETS

Financial Statement—Communication from W. S. Stewart for Legal Action.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held last evening. Mayor Warburton occupied the chair with whom was a full Board.

A communication was read from Mrs. Stamer re permanent sidewalks in front of Stamper Block.

A communication was read from W. S. Stewart notifying the Board that he is prepared to take legal action in behalf of Mrs. A. Doherty for bodily injuries sustained by reason of defective sidewalks on the Brighton Road. Councillors Hooper, Paton and Stewart were appointed a committee to act with the Recorder in the matter.

It was decided to place three incandescent lights on Brighton Road. The Street Committee were directed to make an examination of the lights on Malpeque Road and report.

A resolution was passed expressing disapproval of the School Board towards J. M. Duncan.

Coun. Paton read the financial statement of Street Committee to Sept. 29th. Total expenditure to date is \$17,283.90.

Coun. Moore withdrew his Bill to amend the rigging of the Carfew.

Considerable discussion was carried on the matter of cess-pools in the city. The Council urged the necessity of the Sanitary Officer taking strong measures.

Coun. Moore's motion that policemen be notified to enforce the Act regarding children being on the streets after nine o'clock, was lost.

Council adjourned.

TORONTO RECEIVES OFFER.

TORONTO, Oct. 9.—Mayor Howland to-day received an offer from F. Gunn, Quebec, of 2,300 tons of soft coal at \$5.50 there, or of 3,000 tons Scotch coal at Montreal at \$6 a ton. The C.P.R. has given the Mayor \$2 a ton from Montreal and \$2.50 from Quebec as their rate for hauling it. He also has an offer from the Hepburn Steamship Company, of Picton, Ont., to bring coal from Montreal at \$1.50 per ton. Those offers will be considered by the Board of Control to-morrow.
