DRY ROT PREVALENT—While attending the Saint John Exhibition last week, Hon. Walter M. Lea, Minister of Agriculture, interviewed Prof. Bailey of the Experimental Farms of Fredericton, N. B., and several prominent farmers from Charlottetown and other potato growing sections of that province, who informed him that the situation regarding blight in potatoes was very scarce, that practically the entire crop had gone down. In many instances fifty per cent. of the crops had already developed "dry rot." Quite a number were already digging in an endeavour to prevent the disease from spreading.

LORNE VALLEY INSTITUTE—The regular monthly meeting of the Lorne Valley Women's Institute met at the home of Miss Munroe on August 11. Eight members and several visitors were present. Meeting opened in the usual way. Minutes were read and approved. Reports of committees were heard. It was decided to hold an Ice Cream Social on August 19th on the School Grounds Committees for attending for some were appointed. A discussion arose as to how the Institute would dispose of the Autograph Quilt and was decided to ask each Women's Institute on Prince Edward Island to buy five 10 cent tickets. Miss Leard was appointed Secretary. After this a pleasant hour was spent and the last and most enjoyable part came, this being Miss Munroe serving a most delicious lunch. Then each one present departed to their homes feeling so happy that the Lorne Valley Women's Institute still met in the very social way.

GOLIATH OF THE NAVY Tragedy of A King's Son

(By British United Press) LONDON, September 12.—In a few days' time a National Assembly is to be convened in Madrid to change the constitution of Spain and ratify the decision of King Alfonso to exclude his eldest son, the Prince of Asturias, and his second son, Prince Jaime from the succession and nominate Prince Juan, the third son, as heir to the throne.

The reason for the King's remarkable decision is a mysterious malady called hemophilia, which has brought tragedy on his family. It is predisposition to hemorrhage, and the slightest blow or wound causes a rush of blood that is almost impossible to check. The Tsarevitch of Russia suffered from it before he was murdered by the Bolsheviks in 1918, and it has undetermined the health of Alfonso Prince of the Asturias.

"We regret to inform you Majesty that there is no hope of the Crown Prince's recovery," a council of the leading specialists of the Royal Palace. "By taking great care of himself, the Prince may live to a ripe age, but the slightest accident, the least shock, or the most insignificant operation at any time may be fatal. We strongly advise against him undertaking the heavy burdens of a sovereign's life, and against his marrying. The disease from which he suffers is hereditary and in all likelihood it would manifest itself in his children.

"In order to make a definite report on the Crown Prince's illness we made a deep study into hemophilia, and we find that the principal cause is a violent shock endured by the father or mother, or both before the children are born. The disease is very common in the Royal Families of Europe, and particularly where there have been assassinations or attempted assassinations.

"In the case of the Prince of the Asturias we studied the medical history of the paternal and maternal ancestors of both your Majesty and of Queen Victoria without finding a strong trace of the disease and we finally came to the conclusion that it was either the result of your father's death, or of the attack made on your Majesty and the Queen on your wedding day."

The first reference was to King Alfonso's birth some months after his father's death. The other to an anarchist's attack on King Alfonso and Queen Victoria when they were driving through the streets of Madrid on May 31, 1906. The bomb wrecked their carriage, killed their horses and tore away bystanders' pieces, but the Royal couple had a miraculous escape from injury.

It was a terrible shock to the Queen, and she was still suffering from it when Prince of the Asturias was born on May 10, 1907, and Prince Jaime, who is stone deaf and dumb, on June 23, 1908.

This bomb attack is now said to be the chief cause of the infirmity of the two elder sons, and it is pointed out that the two younger ones—Juan, born June 30, 1913 and Gonzalo, born October 24, 1914 are in good health.

Gathering of The Clans SKIRL OF BAGPIPES East End Mariners Observe 63rd Anniversary of First Confederation Conference.

The 63rd anniversary of the first conference of the Fathers of Confederation at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, on September 1st, 1864, was fittingly observed by a happy gathering of mariners at 22 Barrington avenue, Toronto. (The home of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. MacPhee, formerly of Charlottetown.) Neighbors were startled by what they regarded as a terrific noise, but many others, more spiritually-minded, perhaps, declared that it was the immortal bagpipes, manipulated by Piper D. J. MacLean, formerly of Charlottetown Prince Edward Island who is, a past master of this sublime art. Several Gaelic songs were sung, and Alan MacDonald, the "Laird" of Scarborough, a native of Cape Breton, N.S., danced the Highland fling and the sword dance. The entire neighborhood enjoyed the programme. The MacLean, MacDonald, MacRae, "Mac" Coles and MacPhee clans were well represented by descendants of pioneer Highlanders who settled down by the sounding sea, in what is now part of Canada, from a hundred to a hundred and fifty years ago. A similar gathering took place at the MacDonald home in Scarborough last week. From the Toronto Evening Telegram.
