

### SOME SOLDIERS WHO RETURNED THIS WEEK

Among the Island soldiers of the 1st Division, who returned home on Tuesday night were the following:

**Pte. Donald Hume M.M.** of Wood Islands an original 105th man, fought two years in France with the 14th; he was wounded at Lens on February 25th, 1917 by a bullet through the arm. He afterwards returned to the Battalion. He won the Military Medal.

**Pte. Ernest Hughes**, another 105th man fought 28 months in France with the 13th Battalion. He was wounded in the hip by shrapnel at Amiens, August 8th.

**Gnr. E. P. Anear** of Montague enlisted in Calgary in the Canadian Field Artillery and was two years in France.

**Pte. Wm. McGarry** of Iona fought a year in France with the 2nd Infantry Battalion; was wounded at Cambrai and was eight weeks in hospital.

**Pte. Walter Bevis** of Halifax came to Charlottetown to be discharged; he fought in France with the 13th and was wounded.

**Pte. John McRae** of Mt. Vernon fought two years in France with the 13th; was twice wounded, first by a bullet in the leg, at Morocq, in February, 1916 and again by shrapnel in the leg at Arras.

**Pte. J. H. McDonald** of Hope field is an original 105th man; he fought 21 months in France with the 13th Battalion, was wounded in the right arm at Passchendaele.

**Pte. Chas. McPhee** of Mitchell River formerly with the 105th, fought a year in France with the 13th; was wounded by shrapnel at Arras on April 9th, 1917.

**Pte. Peter McCloskey** of North West shore, fought a year in France with the 2nd Battalion.

**Pte. James McCloskey** of North West shore, had the same experience as the above.

**Pte. J. W. Straug** of Cape Wolf on listed in the 105th, served 14 months in France with the 2nd Battalion Canadian Engineers.

**Pte. J. W. Acorn** of Glen William formerly with the 105th, fought a year in France with a Machine Gun Battalion, was slightly wounded.

**Pte. Ralph Lightizer** of Lethbridge, Alta., is a nephew of Mr. George Lightizer of Charlottetown. He served 22 months in France with the 8th, C. R. T's.

**Sgt. Joe Campbell** of Montague enlisted in Regina with the 9th, C. M. R.'s, fought 2 1/2 years in France.

**Pte. E. B. McEachern** of Windsor Ont., is a native of Souris; he is listed in the 63rd Battery and was subsequently with the Engineers, serving two years in all in France.

**Pte. F. Gallant** of Bear River enlisted at Cleveland, Ohio and fought the last two years in France with the 6th Infantry Battalion.

**Pte. Joseph Morrison**, of St. Peter's Bay enlisted with the 105th; fought the last 13th months in the war in France with the 1st Machine Gun Battalion.

**Pte. F. J. McDonald** of St. Peter's Bay is a son of Capt. J. McDonald. He was originally with the 105th and fought 2 1/2 years in France with the 13th was wounded in the head by shrapnel at Amiens and was two months in hospital.

**Pte. N.F. McEachern** of Nine Mile Creek is another 105th man; he served over two years in France with the 13th Battalion and was slightly wounded.

**Pte. Hugh McGregor** of Cornwall was formerly with the 105th, was over two years in France with the 14th Battalion.

**Pte. J. J. Walsh** of North Ruston left Charlottetown in August 1914, with the 82nd, draft. He has seen continuous service almost ever since. He served in France with the 4th Canadian Infantry Battalion and was wounded at Ypres on the 8th July 1916.

**Corporal W. L. Delany** of Kensington liked fighting so well that after coming to the Island in November 1915, he went back again for another dose. He re-enlisted in the 236th Battery in August 1916. He left the Island the first time with the 36th P.E. Island Light Horse. He was wounded at Festober on May 19th, 1918.

**Pte. Frank Kennedy** of Montague fought two years in France with the 2nd Infantry Battalion.

**Pte. J. J. Gallant** of Ebbsfleet enlisted in the 105th; fought 15 months in France with the 14th; twice wounded—first in the leg by shrapnel at Vimy Ridge April 9th, 1917 and again at Hill 70 on the 24th November 1917 in the right leg.

**Pte. Joseph Provost** of East Blisford Lot 12, enlisted in the 105th; fought two years in France with the 14th Battalion, was wounded by shrapnel in the lung at Vimy Ridge, April 17th.

**Pte. P. R. Martin** of Montague is an original 105th man, fought 28 months in France with the 13th Battalion.

**Corporal Laughlin McPhee** of Bellevue is another 105th man; he fought 22 months in France with the 13th, was wounded by a machine gun bullet in the arm during a raid at Hill 70; was in hospital six months.

**Pte. Ernest Johnson** of Long River is a son of the late Andrew Johnson; he went overseas with the 8th Siege Battery, under Lieutenant Davison and fought in France for the last 18 months of the war.

**Lance Corporal Ralph Thompson** of Largete enlisted in the 105th, served in France with the 2nd Canadian Engineers Battalion.

**Bombardier G. A. Ready** of Tignish enlisted in the 55th Battalion and fought in France two years with the 8th Battery.

**Pte. Chas. W. McArthur** of Alberton enlisted in Winnipeg with the 107th, fought 30 months in France with the 8th, was wounded in the thigh at Vimy Ridge, April 29th, 1917.

**Gunner Robert Reid** is a son of the late Harry Reid of Charlottetown. He fought three and one half years in France with the 2nd, Heavies and was for a time with the C.F.A.

**Pte. James McCarron** of St. Mary's Road, enlisted in the 55th Battalion, Charlottetown and served in France with the 3rd Canadian Tunnelling Company.

**Pte. William Gillis** of Charlottetown served 14 months in France with the 2nd Canadian Tunnelling Company.

**Pte. David McKay** of Clifton is a son of the late George McKay. He enlisted in Vancouver, was in France or some time with the 7th Battalion.

**Pte. Robert H. McDonald** of Lot 16 served 11 months in France with the 2nd Canadian Engineers.

**Pte. C. Oment** of O'Leary enlisted in the 105th, fought 28 months in France with the 14th; was wounded by bullet and shrapnel in the arm, at Amiens August 8th, and spent three months in hospital.

**Pte. W. B. Mills** of Little River enlisted in Calgary; fought 7 months in France with the 10th Infantry Battalion; was wounded by shrapnel in the jaw at Cambrai.

**Pte. Lamb Arsenaull** of St. Louis enlisted with the 105th and served two years in France with the 14th.

**Pte. Benj. Sencabaugh** is a son of J.A. Sencabaugh of Murray Harbor North. He was formerly with the 105th and fought two years and six months in France with the 13th.

**R. Q. M. S. W. H. Turner** of Winsloe went overseas with the 1st Contingent and fought over four years in France with the 7th Battalion. He served as a Private until the battle of Ypres in 1915 when he received his present rank.

**Pte. W. Cormier** of Wellington enlisted in the 105th; fought 15 months in France with the 1st Machine Gun Battalion.

**Gnr. J. J. Foy** of Tryon enlisted in Charlottetown in the 2nd, Siege Battery was transferred to the 48th, C. F. A. and fought 33 months in France.

**Sgt. E. Proitt** of Kensington enlisted in the 105th and served two years with the 2nd Canadian Engineers.

**Sapper T. Boyce** of Coleman served in France with the 5th Pioneers and the 2nd Canadian Engineers. On August 31st, 1918, he was wounded by shrapnel in the right arm, leg and head at Arras.

**Corporal W. J. Cantello** of Bridgeport enlisted in the 105th, fought 30 months in France with the 14th and the R. M. R's.

**Pte. J. A. McCarron** of Sturgeon is a son of Michael McCarron. He enlisted in the 105th and fought over two years in France with the 13th.

**Pte. George Beez** of Coleman is a 105th man; he fought 20 months in France with the 15th Battalion. He was wounded by a bullet through the leg at Cambrai last September.

**Pte. George McEachern** of St. Catharines enlisted in the 105th, fought 28 months in France with the 14th.

**Pte. F. Doyle**, of Earncliffe, formerly with the 105th, fought 28 months in France with the 13th, was wounded by gushot in the thigh April 9th.

**Pte. J. L. Murdock**, of Murray River, is a brother of David Murdock, of Charlottetown. He enlisted in Lethbridge, Alta., in the 13th Battalion and fought 29 months in France with the 16th Canadian Scottish Battalion.

**Sgt. J. A. McKenzie**, of Bradabane, enlisted in the 105th, fought 28 months



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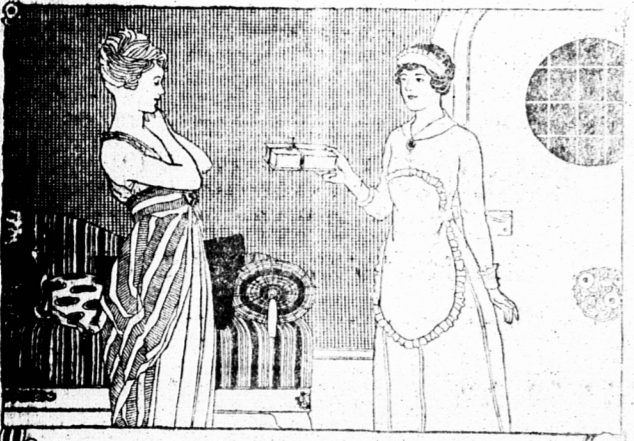
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in France with the 13th; was wounded in the knee by bullet at Hill 70, August 15th, 1917, and in the hand at Amiens August 16th, 1918.

**Pte. S. A. Nicholson**, of St. Peter's Bay, enlisted in the 105th; fought two years in France with the 2nd Engineers.

**Spr. A. Morrison**, of Pinette, enlisted in Vancouver, served two years in France with the 2nd Canadian Engineers.

**Pte. Doiron**, of New Glasgow Mills, enlisted in Calgary with the 10th Battalion. He served for four years; was wounded by bullet in the shoulder in the second battle of Ypres, in July, 1915.

**Pte. J. L. McAulay**, of Campbell's Cove, enlisted in the 105th; fought in France for 28 months with the 13th; was wounded at Vimy Ridge in 1917.

**Pte. P. W. Lackie**, of Miscouche, enlisted in the 100th Battalion in Winnipeg, served 2 years in France with the 3rd Canadian Engineers.

**Spr. C. R. Palmer**, of Roseville, enlisted in the 105th, served in France with the 2nd Canadian Engineers.

**Lance Corporal Wilfred Huestis**, son of Louis Huestis, of Charlottetown, fought in France with the 8th Battalion, Winnipeg Rifles and was wounded.

**Gnr. H. Bambrick**, of Head of Hillsboro, enlisted in the 5th Siege Battery Draft, under Lieutenant Beer. He fought 11 months in France.

**Pte. J. J. Morrison**, of Launching, fought seven months in France with the 2nd Infantry Battalion.

**Pte. A. J. Arsenaull**, of Central Bedouque, enlisted in the 105th; fought 18 months in France with the 1st Machine Gun Battalion.

**Pte. W. B. Dawson**, of Uigg, is a cousin of Captain Ullie Dawson, Charlottetown. He enlisted in Saskatchewan, and served 8 months in France with the 5th West Calgary Regiment.

**Sgt. L. Driscoll**, M. M., of Hillsboro, fought 28 months in France with the 14th Battalion. He received the Military Medal at the Battle of Amiens.

**Gnr. Harry A. McKenzie**, of Cardigan Bridge, is a son of Archibald McKenzie. He enlisted in the 105th; fought 28 months in France with the 1st Machine Gun Battalion.

**Corporal N. McDonald**, M. M., of Little Pond, served 15 months in France with the 2nd Canadian Engineers. He won the Military Medal.

**Sgt. Murdock Gillis**, of Orwell, was four years in France with the 7th Battalion.

THE ITALIAN QUESTION (Special to The Guardian.)

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son. All displayed the strongest desire to reach a satisfactory solution of the problem. The heads of the British and French governments expressed to Premier Orlando the hope that the Italian parliament would assist in arriving at such.

PARIS, April 25.—A distinctly more hopeful and less irreconcilable feeling prevailed at Italian headquarters. No longer was there talk of a breach with the peace conference, but instead it was said that all may be settled within a fortnight. Premier Orlando has gone to Rome to consult the Italian parliament there. Premiers Lloyd George, Clemenceau and President Wilson it is announced will meet in conference at four o'clock this afternoon. The topics to be discussed at the meeting are not known.

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
