

P. W. C. Retain Intercollegiate Title

Score Try In Opening Minutes Of Second Half To Take Third Game 5-0

Scoring a try two minutes after the start of the second half when Art Cantwell, speedy backline of the Prince of Wales, snatched a loose ball P.W.C. yesterday retained the intercollegiate rugby title by defeating Intermediate Saints 5-0 in the third and what proved to be the deciding game of the best out of three series.

Battling to a scoreless deadlock in the first half Cantwell's try came as the fast half-back took advantage of a bit of slack work by the challengers. From the time of the score, which was the only one of the game, Saints tried desperately to push over what might have been the equalizing tally. They kept playing in the Prince of Wales end of the field for practically the balance of the game but they could not get over the last white stripe.

Play even first half

Saints kicked off to Prince of Wales and for the first five minutes play was very even. Saints pressed back to take control of the game but the defending champions gradually pressed back to have an even edge with their rivals. Brent Hooper, shifted to the full-back position by Coach Gordon Bennett had to retire from the game midway through the half when he suffered an injury to his ankle. Sterns, shifted to a forward line position went back to his usual full-back territory and big red-head's kicking was a deciding factor in the latter half of the game.

The Saints had an advantage in the first half that saw neither team being able to score. But two minutes after the start of the final 30 minutes Art Cantwell raced over the Saints line to give the P. W. C. squad not only the winning try but also the series.

P. W. C. were pressing at the time. Attempting a passing play Saints saw a pass go astray. Cantwell gathered in the loose ball and from 20 yards out went over for the only score of the game. Cant-

well then added the extra points as he kicked the convert directly between the posts.

For the balance of the game it was all Saints. Wearers of the red and white pressed forward desperately to take play to the P. W. C. eventing in a placement attempt after not get over. Five minutes from the end Mike Hennessey, kicking-half for the Saints, was just inches short in a placement attempt after the University team were awarded a penalty kick but P. W. C. got the ball out from the 25 yards to nullify the challenger's attempt at a score.

Boston Bruins Click Off Third Straight Victory

BOSTON, Nov. 17—(AP)—The Boston Bruins clicked off their third straight victory, after losing their four first National Hockey League starts, by outskating Montreal's short-handed Canadiens for a 4-1 decision tonight before a skinny crowd of 7,500 at the Boston Garden.

Playing 13 men against 12, the Bruins pulled into the lead during the 18th minute of action when Fiason Hollett finished off a five-man rush by rilling a 40-foot shot through Goalie Paul Bibeault after taking a forward pass from Jack Crawford, his defence partner.

Both teams went scoreless during the lively second period, when each drew penalties. Montreal's Chamberlain slipped the puck into an empty cage after Busher Jackson pulled Bibeault out with a steaming shot during the fifth minute of the final. The Bruins brothers then gave the Bruins their last two goals, Art converting Bill Cowley's first and Busher registering Hollett's put-out with only 36 seconds remaining.

Canadians ruled Frankie Brimsek's shut-out hopes midway through the third period when:

with Hollett in the penalty box, Buddy O'Connor headed a three-man rush and counted a high 30-foot shot. The visitors put on a furious attack during most of the last 10 minutes of play and the over-aggressiveness opened the gates for a Hollett breakaway that set up Busher Jackson's last minute tally.

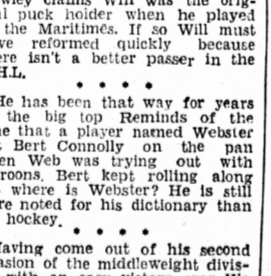
