to remark that "Mr. Hammell was always a Liberal but used the U.F.O. organization in Muskoka as a derelict to hoist him into Parliament and having got there he now goes where he should always have been. We feel that the agricultural group has gained immeasurably by his desertion." But what if other deserters in fives and tens shall rat in like fashion, as is threatened and for no better reason?

In the recent bye-election in Lanark the electors who had been strongly Progressive in previous provincial and federal contests ranked themselves as Conservatives and Liberals at the polls and in the five recent bye-elections the Progressives made no more show than if that party had never existed or had passed out of existence. Surely these facts afford no evidence that the party is growing immeasurably stronger, as Mr. Morrison professes to believe. Progress by desertion looks more like disintegration than like strength and solidity.

Many other Progressives like Mr. Hammell, during the last session of Parliament showed where their hearts were when they voted every profession on which they had run the election of a few months before and rejected the main planks of the Progressive platform to vote for Mr. Fielding's highly protectionist tariff. It was then and there that the United Farmers of the West abdicated and abandoned whatever claims they before had to be a separate political party.

It seems to be agreed by all parties that Prince Edward Island is a grand and glorious country in soil, climate, healthfulness, exemption from extremes of heat and cold, from earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, cyclones, rattlesnakes, fogs droughts and untimely frosts. It is quite on the verge of Heaven, as the dear Patriot would say. Does it not follow as the night the day, that we ought to have an equally excellent and perfect government? Obviously it does. Do we have it? That is a matter upon which our people are not so unanimous as they are about our superb country.

It is true that certain members of the government of the day have proclaimed themselves to be "the best government in the world," but the claim is disputed by thousands. These thousands ask questions and because the government or its organs will not answer the questioners answer themselves. Is the public health of the country satisfactory? No. Far from it. Tuberculosis more rampant than in any other province and increasing; 85 per cent of the children at school defective; 25 per cent under size and suffering from malnutrition. What is the government doing about it? Nothing except to close the Sanatorium!
