INQUEST ADJOURNED—The inquest into the death of John David Johnson whose body was found in Grand River at Bridgetown on May 9 was again adjourned yesterday by Coroner Seymour Knight. Constable Cordwell went to Bridgetown yesterday to continue the investigation of the case. The report of the analysis of the lungs and contents of the stomach of the deceased has not yet been received from Halifax.

INJURED WHEN HORSE BOLTED—Thrown from their carriage when their horse ran away, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Blaquiere, Toronto, and their daughter, Miss Nora, received severe injuries at Hope River on Sunday last. The carriage was overturned when the animal bolted, with the result that all three were precipitated heavily to the ground. Mr. Blaquiere sustained several fractured ribs, and all three suffered from the severe shock. Miss Blaquiere who is a talented musician and amateur actress was to have taken part in a play at Hope River on Monday night.

POLICE COURT—At the Police Court yesterday morning two cases of unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor were dismissed. Two cases for breach of the Sanitary by-law were dealt with. One was dismissed, as the defendant had cleaned up his yard. The defendant in the second was fined \$2 and costs.

JUDGMENT IN CHANCERY—A judgment of much importance was given last week by Mr. Justice Saunders, Master of the Rolls, in a chancery case, wherein the P. E. I. Mutual Insurance Co., and another were complainants and Oliver Best and another were defendants. The suit involved an attempt on behalf of the complainants to set aside a suit of conveyance given by defendant to son at a date anterior to a judgment received against him. Hearing of the case occupied two days last February when judgment was reserved for argument at a later date. His Lordship gave written judgment dismissing the complainants' bill. The case is considered as quite important as the judgment affects a number of late cases of conveyance of father to son while the father had outstanding obligations. Thane A. Campbell, K.C., and J. O. C. Campbell appeared for the complainants and Nell McLeod, K.C., and C.D. McCallum for the defendants. It is understood that an appeal will be entered.

LIVESTOCK MINING

LIVESTOCK (Canadian Press) — Montreal, May 17.—Offerings on the two Montreal livestock markets today totalled 582. Receipts were composed of 35 cattle, 449 calves, 100 pigs and 17 sheep and 11 sheep and lambs. There were not enough cattle for sale to make a market. Calves were about steady. Just plain to fair drinkers brought \$3.50 to \$4.00 and \$3.50 to \$4.00. Medium to medium good lambs brought \$12 per cwt. sheep were about steady. Hogs were unchanged. Pigs and butchers brought \$8 to \$8.15; select heavies \$8.50 to \$9.00; extra heavies \$8 to \$8.15; lights \$7.75 to \$8.15; and sows \$3.50 to \$4, according to quality.

PRODUCE (Canadian Press) — Montreal, May 17.—With production resulting in receipts being a little ahead of current needs, wholesale butchers are selling gradually each day to level where the surplus butter will be taken and stored or exported. A portion of the butter, however, was recorded on the Montreal daily and produce market today. No 1 cream, 17 1/2 cents; No 2, 16 1/2 cents; No 3, 15 1/2 cents; No 4, 14 1/2 cents; No 5, 13 1/2 cents; No 6, 12 1/2 cents. The egg market continued to hold steady at the recent improvement. Graded shipments in cartons or less are 17 cents for extras, 15 cents for firsts and 13 cents for seconds. Receipts were 2849 cases. The potato market held at the week's advance, with prices at 80 to 90 cents for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island green maintains in 80 pound bags.
