THE GUARDIAN'S BICYCLE ROAD RACE

The date of The Guardian's bicycle road race has been definitely fixed for August twenty eighth.

Entries are to be confined to Prince Edward Island riders alone. The race is for The Guardian's three-year trophy; but in addition thereto L. E. Prowse, of Prowse Bros., Ltd., offers a gold medal to the winner of this year's race; W. M. Tanton jeweler, of this city, offers a silver trophy to the one who wins second place. W. E. Moran of the Union Commercial College offers a silver medal. On arrival there he found his sister had come ashore. The girl did not know his address and thinking she had gone to some private boarding house he did nothing on Sunday but when the girl did not turn up on Monday he notified the police.—Inquiry into this case elicited the fact that a Miss Lizzie Baird was at one time employed as a domestic in this city. Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY person numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section acres, more or less.

Entry must be made, personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land to each year for three years.

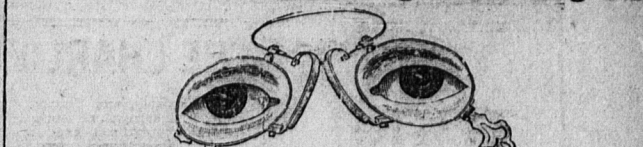
(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land, and if the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for entry.

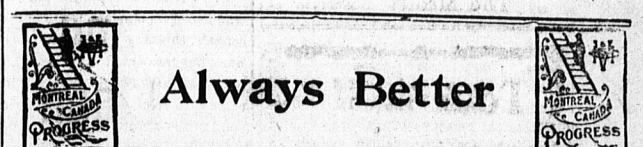
