POWDERY SCAB.—The following are the principal points made by Mr. Adams in his address on Monday night at Montague. Powdery Scab cannot be controlled by seed treatment or by spraying of the vines. Where cases of this disease have occurred, the seed should be changed and planted on land that has not grown potatoes for at least 10 years. It would be unwise to pick out apparently sound potatoes from a diseased crop, as the spores are so small as to be visible with the naked eye. The sooner Powdery Scab is wiped out the better. It can be done if all growers of potatoes will make up their minds to do it. Every possible should attend the meetings which will be held at Tracadie Cross, Thursday, Murray River, Friday and Kinkora, Saturday. All meetings will begin at 7.30 p. m.

Old animosities between us are dead—(loud and prolonged cheers)—scattered like the autumn leaves to the four winds of Heaven. We are a united nation. (Loud cheers.)

Owing and paying to our Sovereign the heartfelt allegiance of men who at home not only love but enjoy for themselves the liberty which our soldiers and our sailors are fighting by land and by sea to maintain and to extend for others—(Cheers)—there is no question of compulsion or bribery. (Cheers.) what we want, and we believe you are ready and eager to give, is the free offering of a free people. (Great cheering.)

Premier, and through him the people of Great Britain that Ireland was in heartfelt sympathy with the objects of this war—(cheers)—and that she would bear her share of the burdens and the sufferings entailed by the war with alacrity and gallantry. The right to autonomy—he would not use the words Home Rule—had been conceded by the democracy of Great Britain, and therefore, Ireland would feel bound in honour to take her place side by side with all the other autonomous portions of the King's Dominions. (Cheers.)

The heart of Ireland had been profoundly moved by the spectacle of the heroism and the sufferings of Belgium. (Cheers.) The other day, in London, he met the Cardinal Archbishop of Malines, and he took the opportunity of promising him then that Ireland would bring her arms and her strength to avenge Louvain—(loud cheers)—and to uphold the integrity and independence of Belgium. (More cheers.) Ah, yes! Belgium, Alsace-Lorraine and France—these were words to conjure with the Irish people. (Hear, hear.)

"Never a Juster War."

There never was—that, he believed, was the universal sentiment of Ireland—a juster war or one in which higher and nobler principles and issues were at stake. (Cheers.) Ireland's highest material interests were at stake.

"I take leave to say," exclaimed Mr Redmond, in reference to Ireland's services to the army, "that in proportion to our population we have a larger quota serving in the fighting line than any other part of the United Kingdom. (Cheers.) As for quality, let Sir John French answer for one, let my kind fellow-countryman, Admiral Beatty, speak from Heligoland, and let also the Irish Guards, marching into battle—"God Save Ireland"—and the Munster Fusiliers, and the Dublin and the Inniskilling Fusiliers, let them speak." (Cheers.)

Mr Redmond mentioned that an Englishman had offered five thousand pounds towards the expenses of an Irish brigade, and went on, "We want

an army corps, so that their deeds of valour in the field will be garnered by us as one of the measures of our nation in the future. (Cheers.)

"I hope that no people in Great Britain, and perhaps I ought to say in Germany, will imagine that because there are a handful of pro-Germans in Ireland—(hisses)—that there is any doubt as to the sentiments of Nationalists of this country. (Cheers.) Mr Redmond addressing Mr Asquith, said: "You have kept faith with Ireland, Ireland will keep faith with you." (Prolonged cheers, the audience rising en masse.)
