White Star Liner Majestic Damaged

LONDON, Dec. 30.—On the arrival of the White Star liner Majestic at New York after her last outward voyage says the Daily Mail, a large crack was discovered on the port side reaching from C deck to D deck, but not to the water line. The ship will at once be taken off the Atlantic service to be overhauled at Southampton and it is believed the necessary repairs will be so extensive that she will not be ready to sail again until April. New Glasgow Team 5th American Ace Beat Dalhousie By 4 to 1 Score To Become Manager

NEW GLASGOW, Dec. 30.—The Dalhousie University hockey team dropped their first game of the season to New Glasgow yesterday evening, when the locals ran up a score of 4-1 against them. Six hundred hockey fans saw the initial appearance of last year's Provincial champions. The game was a fair display of Canada's national sport, but neither team played good hockey. The locals would at times show their old form, but played the individual style too much. The combination was poor at times, although some fine pieces of work were pulled off. Dalhousie did excellent work and were quite brilliant. They cut a nasty dip in the first period, but weakened in the last two stanzas.

The first period opened up fast and within five minutes of play Dunlop of the defence scored Dalhousie's only goal from a close in shot. Play went back and forth. Williams and the score on the pass from George McKay, about seven minutes after play. The rest of the period saw both teams charging each other and covering both the goals with rubber, but neither team scored again.

The second session was the local's feature. Dal jumped to the offense, but New Glasgow soon had them cornered. McLeod intercepted a neat pass from McKay and scored again. Score 3-1.

The last session was about even, both teams working hard for a counter. Play was about even, the locals having a slight edge on this session. With just half a minute to go, Williams scored the final tally for the locals.

Bubar, of New Glasgow, and Lewis, of Dalhousie, did some sensational goal tending. They both received a warning during the evening. Referee Currie for falling on the ice, contrary to the hockey rules. Wilson and Dunbar on the defence. Beazley, Dunlop and Bates of the forward line were the sensational players of black and gold line-up. There was not very much to choose from any individual style of the local players, though Williams, McLeod and McKay displayed some snappy work. The combination plays of both teams was not very encouraging. The locals seemed to have stage fright in the first period and seemed to forget they were in a game. The second period was the only display of hockey during the evening. McDougall, Williams, McKay of the locals, and Wilson, Creighton and Dunlop of Dalhousie served time in the penalty box. The ice was in very good condition. D. C. Currie refereed the game in a very satisfactory manner.

The fans were pleased with the showing the locals made tonight. They will play against Antigonish on Friday night, the first game in the A. P. C. League.

J. McGillivray's White Leghorns were 7th, with 24 eggs. Mr. Edward Bullpitt's pens of White Leghorns No. 4 lead the Contest with 22 eggs. Sam McPherson's White Leghorns are 2nd with 164 eggs. G. F.
