Russian Troops Concentrate On Turkish Border

BELGRADE, March 9.—(AP)—Soviet Russia was said in diplomatic circles tonight to be concentrating troops in the Caucasus, near the Turkish frontier, as a precaution against German forces which appeared likely to attempt to smash into Greece and perhaps Turkey.

Hitler may be Changing to New tactics

British Aid Bill passes U. S. Senate

The vote, coming after three weeks of oratory and dispute, was 60 to 31.
