THE PANAMA CANAL.

The treaty between the United States and the new Republic of Panama has been ratified by the Senate at Washington and is now in full force and effect. Stirring events in the Far East have quite overshadowed the Panama affair, and as Columbia is not likely to go to war against fearful odds the new conditions in Central America may be accepted as pretty firmly established, the more so as the United States has guaranteed the independence of Panama. In fact the little new Republic under this guarantee may be assumed to be quite as secure, humanly speaking, as any state in South America, however long or justly established.
The Panama Canal will now be pushed to completion. The United States is fully committed to it, the national interests demand its construction and the nation is well able to build and pay for it. We have freely expressed our opinion of the worse than doubtful proceedings which have led up to the present conditions. We think the same end might have been gained by less questionable means, but still we recognize the world's need of the Panama Canal, and we are pleased to find its construction now assured at the earliest possible date. Within a comparatively few years ships of all nations, waterborne, will cross the isthmus which has so long formed a barrier to commerce, and the world will be a great gainer by the improvement.
We also regard with satisfaction the fact that the two great trans-isthmian canals which mean so much to the commerce of the present and the future will be under the control of the two great Anglo-Saxon powers. Britain at Suez will stand sentinel over the passage between Africa and the European-Asiatic continent, while the United States will hold a like mastery over the passage between North America and South America. This accords with the fitness of things and secures a larger measure of freedom and justice in regard to world-transportation than if these great gateways were held by any other nation or nations. War or revolution are not of themselves desirable things, but as it has been said that "civilization sometimes moves forward on a powder cart," so we may hope that out of the rather shady revolutions in Panama may come a new impetus to the commerce of the world.

LIBERALS WHO DID NOT VOTE.
The figures of the recent St. John by-election when compared with those of the general election may serve to throw light upon the situation there. In 1900 the Liberal vote was 4,520; at the recent election it fell to 3,440, a reduction of 1,080 votes. The Conservative vote in 1900 was 3,323 and at the recent election was 3,700, a gain of 377. This gain is hardly more than the ordinary fluctuation between any one election and the next. It might perhaps be accounted for by the greater personal popularity of Dr. Daniel the new member elect, than that of Hon. Mr. Foster who was the Conservative standard-bearer at the general election.

Mr. Foster, while admitted to be an exceedingly able man, has not been hitherto a personally popular one, and certainly had not the same close acquaintance with the city and its people as Dr. Daniel had, the latter have been several times Mayor of the City.

Doubtless, too, there were other considerations affecting the election. Mr. Blair was an exceptionally strong candidate, and no other man could probably have taken so strong a vote as he received in 1900. But after making all due allowance for matters of that kind we are bound to remember the fact that the vote of 1904 was less than that of 1900 by some 894 votes. Delecting from this the Conservative gain of 180 and it becomes apparent that there were about 700 who voted Liberal in 1900 who did not vote at all in 1904. These stay-at-home Liberals really decided the contest. They were dissatisfied, whether with the Grand Trunk Pacific, or with the Government's treatment of St. John, or with the choice made of a Liberal candidate, or all of these matters combined. They would not vote against their party, however, and they would not vote with the Opposition. They simply refrained from voting with what result we have seen.

BATTLE, Mont., Feb. 25.—Five miners were killed by a cave-in of earth and rock in the Minnie Healy mine this afternoon, the accident occurred on the sixth floor of the 100 foot level.
