LONDON, Oct 14—According to an authentic report, Admiral Sir John Fisher, senior Naval Lord of the Admiralty, will retire on October 22nd, and will be elevated to the Peerage, with the title of Baron Thetford.

TORONTO, Oct 14—The estate of Mrs Goldwin Smith amounts to \$637,000. Her residence, "The Grange," will pass to the City of Toronto at Goldwin Smith's death as an Art Museum.

ALL NOT ROSY FOR STEEL-COAL MERGER.

MONTREAL, Oct 13—The Financial Editor of the Star says: While the directors of the Dominion Steel Company are not directly interested in the negotiations with Mr James Ross, they are naturally keen observers of every move that is made and have more or less direct views of the matter in so far as their own company is concerned.

There has been a good deal of talk lately in regard to a possible lease, but we are in a position to state authoritatively that the suggested lease does not meet with the approval of the leading interests in Steel.

They are, however, in favor of any reasonable merger that can be effected on an equitable basis, a merger offering a good working union of interests for the shareholders of both Steel and Coal.

At the moment the situation is not very clear, but the view is confidently expressed in high quarters that a satisfactory position will be reached and that a deal of some kind will result from the present negotiations.

43 GRAINS ARSENIC EQUALS INSURANCE.

LOCKPORT, N. Y., October 13—In the Supreme Court, the trial of Mrs Blanche Buzalski, of Niagara Falls, indicted for the murder, in the first degree, of Sophia Kaminiski, was begun.

About thirty talesmen had been examined up to six o'clock, resulting in the selection of five jurors. The defendant is charged with administering arsenic to Sophia, a domestic who was in her employ. It is alleged that the Buzalski woman ran employment bureaus in Toronto, Chicago, and Niagara Falls, getting positions for young Polish girls. She claims she brought Sophia from Poland at an expense of one hundred and fifty dollars. The prosecution charges that Mrs. Buzalski insured the girl's life for one hundred and ninety six dollars, and had insured many other girls for whom she got positions. After the girl's death the Cononer investigated and found forty-three grains of arsenic in the stomach.

Mrs Buzalski claimed she gave the girl some white powders, but under the doctor's orders. The three doctors in the case were called, and it was found that two of the prescriptions left with Mrs Buzal for the patient were never filled, but were left on the table in her house. The prosecution will try to prove that the girl was murdered for the insurance money. Chat. E. Cromley, for the defence, will set up the suicide theory.
