## TERROR STRICKEN CZAR REMAINS IN SECLUSION

Annual Parade of Horse Guards for First Time Without His Presence in St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, April 7.—The annual parade of the horse guards—a way heretofore one of the most spectacular military ceremonies as well as a social function of the year, was chiefly notable to-day by the absence of the Emperor, Nicholas and the imperial family. The horse guards is the emperor's own regiment and never before has he failed to attend its annual parade. With the Empress Dowager, Empress and the entire court, the emperor remained at Tsarsko Selo. The only Grand Duke who ventured out of their palaces were Nicholas, Boris and Alexander Michaelovich representing his majesty. Even Grand Duke Vladimir, commander of the military district, was not present. The explanation being that he was detained at palace on account of sickness. The danger to the imperial family was regarded as especially great to-day, as it happened this was the festival of the immaculate conception, one of the strictest religious holidays. All business was suspended, the entire population was in the streets and the fear of an untoward incident in view of the activity of the terrorists induced extraordinary precautions. Mounted gendarmes were stationed at the bridge and in the street leading to the barracks of the regiment on the boulevard to keep away a crush and ordinary spectators were not allowed to approach within a block. The parade, instead of occurring as usual before the barracks, took place within the riding school, being in every way a purely penitentiary affair, a few foreigners representatives of members of society being present. After the trooping of the colors the regiment marched to the church of the Ascension adjoining the barracks, where services were held. The area around the church was filled with solid phalanxes of cuirassiers and equestrian guards, who later greeted the Grand Duke Nicholas as he emerged from the portal with the "hurrahs," always given to members of the imperial family. The public had only a glimpse of the representative of reigning dynasty and no echoing cheers came from the crowd. The ceremony of trooping the colors was also carried out in the square of the winter palace by the troops. The police made a number of arrests, but both military displays happily passed off without disturbance.

## RUSSIA'S CREED COMPENSATES BITTERNESS AND DESPAIR

Necessary that Russian Mujiks Should be Religious to Accept Coercion

St. Petersburg, April 7.—The inside history of the movement for the freedom of the orthodox church from the bureaucracy of the Holy Synod, shows that it owed its initiation to President Witte at a meeting of the committee of ministers during the consideration of the question of tolerance of all faiths which was raised by the Ukase of Dec. 19, 1901. M. Witte delivered an eloquent speech on the necessity of keeping alive the faith among the ignorant poverty stricken Mujiks who comprised 120,000,000 of the population of Russia and declared that in the bitterness and despair of their lives, religion was the only compensation. Without faith he said the foundation of the whole Russian state would be destroyed. Antonius, the Metropolitan, of St. Petersburg, who was present, was greatly impressed and discussed with M. Witte the deplorable condition of the church. As a result of this discussion M. Witte drew up a memorandum to the throne in the favor of calling an ecclesiastical council to reform the church administration system. This document was followed by a petition in a similar vein signed by the metropolitan Antonius and bishops and priests. Procurator Pobedonostsev is reported to have been furious at M. Witte. He wrote to Emperor Nicholas, advising that the whole question of religious action be turned over to the Holy Synod. The venerable procurator, however, found that he could not command a majority of the Synod for his proposition and retired from the field beaten. His aid, Stalder, tried to create the impression that M. Pobedonostsev himself favored the council, but the procurator really was so chagrined that he is reported to have resigned. This, however, is denied. The Rusly Stovo in giving an account of M. Pobedonostsev's action says: "The dried up idol will fall soon or the church will be paralyzed."

## MONTREAL ALDERMAN'S HONOR AT STAKE

Alleged That He Was Bribed to Vote for a C. P. R. Measure by Being Given a Pass on the Railway.

MONTREAL April 8.—A libel action involving the honor of the City Council was started this morning. Ald. Vallier and chairman of the Finance Committee against the Montreal Brewing Co. for \$10,000 damages. The latter company protested Ald. Vallier's vote in the scheme before the council to close certain streets for the extension of the C. P. R. yards and claimed he had opposed the railway until they gave him an annual pass, when he suddenly changed his views, and supported the plan which was finally carried. President Cushing of the Brewing Co. was a witness this morning and accused Ald. Vallier of using \$500 worth of passes on the C. P. R. and also lending his pass to other aldermen and declared this justified him protesting his vote. He further claimed that other aldermen are in the habit of accepting passes from the railway.

The argument re admission of Newfoundland to the Dominion was continued by the Finance Minister (J. E. Matthews). His eloquence brought eulogiums from the Leader of the Opposition who followed in a witty speech. The Leader of the Government took up the gauntlet and reviewed the arguments advanced by both sides. After a few words from the mover of the amendment (opposition) the amendment was put and lost. The Government's motion then carried.

The usual stages of advancement having been effected the next order of business brought up the Government's measure re the Encouragement of the Manufacture of Condensed Milk in Canada. The Premier in introducing the bill adverted to the great demand by the Yukon for our canned productions. He made a forceful plea for the expeditious carrying of the bill. The member for Hastings (J. B. Howatt) pointed out that bonused industries were sometimes retroactive, over production in canned milk might send the price down. Our farmers will take what fine pays them best.

The hour of adjournment having arrived the house adjourned.

The Legislative Halls were graced by the presence of a number of ladies, who enjoyed the privilege of listening to the debate.

There was a small attendance at the market yesterday and supplies limited. Eggs were quite plentiful and sold at 16c per doz. Butter, in print, brought 25 to 27c per lb.

Quite a number of wild geese and brant were in which sold respectively at 75 to \$1.00 each and \$1.00 to 1.25 per pair.

Very little hay was in and the price remains about 80c per cwt. Oats sold from 50 to 52c per bus; potatoes 25 to 30c; turnips 15c.

Pork remains at 61 to 63c per lb.

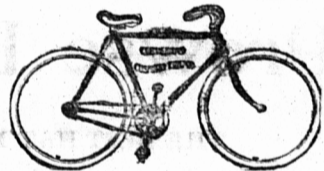
