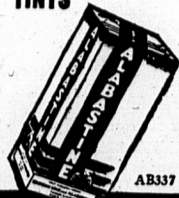

Horticulture

NOTES FROM THE EXPERIMENTAL FARM (J. A. Clark, Superintendent)

The season of 1937, although not opening as early as 1936 has advanced very rapidly recently and the trees have appeared green about four days earlier than last year and from a week to ten days earlier than the average for a number of years.

Field Notes

The first working of the land was somewhat later than last year, but work was started on May 3rd and seeding commenced at the station on May 4th. This is several days earlier than usual but six days later than last year.

Animal Husbandry

The herd sire, "Byrne Hill Wide Awake," No. 153307, Class AA, of the Experimental Station, was sold to Mr. John Lewis, Freetown, and "Ottawa Old Times," No. 172387, a son of the famous Central Experimental Farm cow "Relief Lucy" (Imp.) No. 83933, was secured to head the herd of Ayrshires.

Poultry

The Mt. Edward Road is being widened and sub-graded. In order to do this it was necessary to remove a large number of trees along the front of the Experimental Station. Fortunately, there was a wide belt of birches and other trees and it has been possible to retain sufficient to maintain the very beautiful line of white birches which has been the admiration of many visitors to the Station.

Treating Shingles

Unfinished shingles on roof of siding constitute a fire hazard which easily may be eliminated by painting or staining. Unless the precaution is taken, the surface has a tendency to warp, crack and become "fuzzy," affording an easy lodgment for cinders, burning brands, etc.

Illustration Stations

The Superintendent of the Experimental Farm and the Supervisor of Illustration Stations, have visited the 14 operators in the Province and found the work progressing very satisfactorily. During the winter, the operator at Wood Islands, Mr. Alexander Matheson, died but the work will be carried on by his sons under the name of Matheson Brothers. At Rose Valley, Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, operator, died suddenly and was buried at the Bradabane Cemetery on May 9th. The work at this Station will be continued by his son, John MacKenzie. The earliest cultivation at any of these stations was at Alliston where work commenced on April 28 and there and at Wood Islands and Iona. The grass and clover was much better than was expected at the Stations throughout the Province and alfalfa wintered particularly well at Alliston and Glenwood.
