CITY AND COUNTRY

Guardian Correspondents Everywhere.

WE have to record the death of the above named resident, father of Mr. Lionel Parks, of the Journal's mechanical staff which took place on Sunday last, May 19th, at 11.55 a.m. The deceased who was a son of the late William Firbrace Parks, of Waukenham, Demerara, was born at Fogo, Newfoundland, on 24th April, 1848. When in his 19th year his father died and he remained for a short time on the family estate in Demerara, afterwards residing in P. E. Island, and also sojourned for a period in England, during which time he attended the West Brompton School of Art, and matriculated from the Royal College of Preceptors in May, 1883. After the fire in 1897 he went to P. E. Island, returning to Windsor the following year. A cousin of the deceased, Mr. E. B. Alleyne, resides at Mt. Stewart, P. E. Island. Deceased was married in P. E. I. to Miss Katherine Roache Williams, of that place, by whom he had two children, Charlotte Louise, and his surviving son. Both wife and daughter are now dead, Mrs. Parks dying a few years after her marriage.—Windsor Journal.

THE Charlottetown Branch of the Red Cross Society has received from headquarters in London, a warrant giving permission to use the badge of Emblem and to perform acts consistent with the object of the society. The warrant may be seen in Haszard & Moore's window.

The following is a full text of the warrant:— CANADIAN BRANCH. BRITISH NATIONAL SOCIETY. —FOR AID TO THE SICK AND WOUNDED IN WAR.

Whereas, the British National Society for aid to the sick and wounded in war, commonly called the British Red Cross Society in Council assembled, did, on the first day of December 1896 accept and approve of the formation of a Canadian Branch affiliated with itself for all purposes consistent with the terms of the Geneva Convention, entered into by the Imperial Government in the year 1865 and did grant to the Canadian Branch complete independence in all matters relating to finance and organization.

And whereas the Canadian Branch of the Red Cross Society has been formed and organized and a constitution adopted for its government and by artical VIII of the said constitution the Central Council may issue its warrant authorizing the formation of Local Branches subject to rules issued by the Council.

Now wherefore by virtues of the authority vested in the Central Council this warrant is issued to the duly appointed officers and members of the Charlottetown P. E. Island Branch with permission to use the badge or Emblem of the Canadian Red Cross Society and to perform all acts consistent with the object of the society as set forth in its Constitution and rules.

And this warrant shall remain in force until it be withdrawn by order of the Council. Signed on behalf of the Red Cross Society this 29th day of December, A. D. 1900.

FOOTBALL MATCH AT PICTOU YESTERDAY

A Very Large Crowd Crossed Over by the S. S. Stanley

THE EXCELLENT GAME RESULTED IN A DRAW

In Favor of the Abegweits.—The Charlottetown Team Played well.—The Pictou Team Composed of Many Good Players.—Return Match will Probably be Played in a few Days.

Notwithstanding the lowering clouds and the threatening aspect of the weather over 160 persons took advantage of the excursion to Pictou yesterday in connection with the visit of the Abegweit Football Team to that town, there to engage in friendly contest with the Nova Scotians.

The "Stanley" threw off her lines from the Steam Navigation wharf at 7.15 a. m., and after a pleasant sail of three hours reached Pictou where the visitors were heartily greeted on their arrival. Meaning the sun had scattered the clouds, and brought cheer to many hearts. Quite a number had come in from neighboring towns, and when the opposing teams lined up at 2.10 o'clock on the P. A. A. grounds there were many lovers of the game present.

The "battle-ground" was in fairly good condition and while the weather was fine, yet a strong northerly wind blew directly down the field.

Pictou won the toss, and chose to defend the north goal. The ball was kicked off for the Abbies by C. McQuillan, and returned to scrimmage at centre, from which position the Abegweits gradually worked the sphere back to there opponents 25 yard line. The red and white then gained ground and by a series of scrimmages and dribbles again brought the ball to centre field, and kicked into touch at Abbies 25 yard line; after the throw out the teams fought for advantage between the latter position and centre line, the greater weight of the Pictou forwards telling in their favor. By a splendid run C. McDonald carried the ball from a scrimmage well up the field for Pictou; here the Abbies were awarded a free kick on foul by their opponents and play was resumed at centre.

Pictou were here given a free kick which, however, did not result to any advantage; they soon worked to the Islander's five yard line and for a moment play looked dangerous for our team. Ritchie however relieved by a good kick to 25 yard line. In remaining moments of first half, play remained near centre.

In the second half the play was more open and the Abbies fast halves, fed in good shape by the quarters, got in many good runs and did some excellent passing. The forwards too seemed to improve as time went on, and were successful in holding down their heavier opponents and many times broke through the latter's scrim.

Pictou's kick off was returned by Cyrus McMillan to the Abbies 25 line where the ball was scrimmaged. Moran made successful run of 15 yards on pass from Byron Brown, Pictou putting back to Abbies 25 yard line.

"Toby" McMillan made an excellent run to centre. On pass from "Scrim" Cameron returned for Pictou by short run. Mc-

Eachern successfully dribbled ball to his opponent's 10 yard line, and the latter were forced to rouse on punt over line from C. McQuillan.

The remaining moments of the game saw the ball between centre and Pictou's 25 yard line, with excellent runs by the Abegweits' half line who many times carried the ball close to their opponents goal line. Thus the game ended in a draw in favor of the Abegweits.

to be congratulated on the success attending his efforts both financially and otherwise.

The Abegweits gave their Pictou brethren some pointers on passing.

The Abegweit team and their friends dined at the Hotel Wallace.

The Stanley left on return at 4 o'clock reaching the city at 7.30.

It is understood that the Pictou team will visit Charlottetown in the course of the next two weeks to play a return match with the Abegweits.

The Pictou team included a number of

players chosen from outside that town, among whom was Cameron who played half back on Dalhousie's first team last season.

The old members of the Abegweit team played an excellent game and the work done by the new men was most creditable, fully justifying their selection for the various positions given them. The enthusiasm and ability displayed by the latter speaks volumes for the perpetuation of the game in our midst.

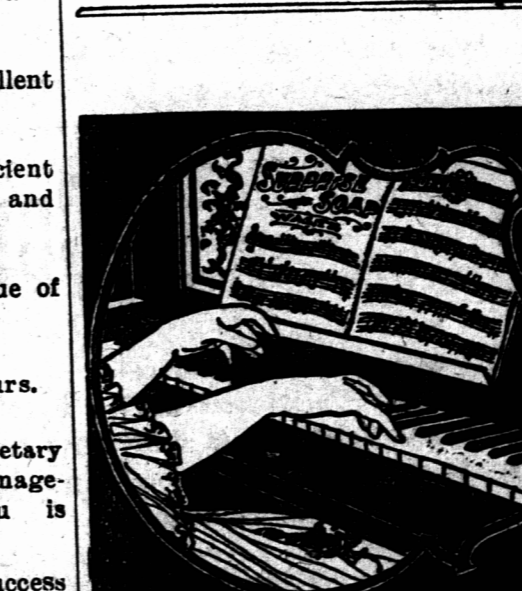
