## "WHITE SLAVERS" ARE MILLIONAIRES

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 19.—Two of the chief leaders of the European "white slave" trade have been seized by the Russian police and a detailed story of a yearly congress they used to hold, when girls from all Continental countries were bargained for and sold, has just been disclosed. Information which will be of great value to the Czar's Secret Service has been obtained by putting the two men through the "third degree."

The two men arrested are Germans, named Celber and Muller, and both are now millionaires. They will be tried in the Warsaw courts within the next three weeks, but it was at the preliminary examination that they confessed. The police had previously wrenched most of their secrets from them, and when they came up before the magistrate they admitted to him that they used to hold a yearly congress either at Rokizna or Baryk, both villages in Western Russia, not far away from Warsaw. All the agents working for Celber and Muller in Germany, Austria, France and Russia attended. Very often the mothers and fathers of the girls to be disposed of joined the party in order to receive the payment. The prices paid ranged from \$25 to \$500. One of the most interesting cases at Rokizna, was that of a girl about 5 feet high, with great brown eyes and swarthy skin, touched by a high color on the cheeks. This girl, who was only 15 years old, was sold by her brother-in-law, a rich merchant of Lodz for \$800 to Celber and Muller.

After the selection of the girls was made Celber and Muller divided them into three groups one for New York, the second for Buenos Ayres and the third for Rio de Janeiro. Unfortunately for the men who were running this market, the police of Warsaw were informed, and they smashed down the doors of the Rokizna Hotel in the midst of the "congress." The girls were at once released and the agents sent to jail. Two elderly Polish women who had accompanied their daughters in order to get their

price in cash were also arrested. Celber and Muller's agents by promising lives of ease and luxury, had disturbed the weak intellect of these young girls, who were mostly uneducated, but extremely handsome, drawn from the ranks of domestic servants, country maids and seamstresses. Consequently the girls protested vigorously against their release and seemed bitterly disappointed when told they were free.

During the police examination it was ascertained that Celber and Muller had paid more than \$50,000 annually in tips to Russian Customs officers in order to avoid being questioned or held up while crossing the Russo-German frontier with the girls.

### HYGIENIC BEDS.

One of the first things that strikes people when paying their initial visit to France, says Lloyd's Weekly, is the number of pillows, blankets, and kindred bed paraphernalia draped over the window sills. While not exactly advocating this continental habit of obtaining a hygienic bed for this country, we certainly would lay stress upon the necessity of efficient airing of bed clothes every day. Too many people just throw back the clothes for a minute or two and then replace them with a few pats and pulls to free the sheets from creases. As soon as the room is free, open the windows top and bottom. Take off the clothes over by one, shake and spread them over two chairs placed back to back. Shake the pillows and place them on a chair near the window. Turn the mattress up so that air can circulate freely all round it. Shake the night garments, and hang them up. Open the door and leave the room for an hour and a half. If mothers would insist on their children preparing the rooms in this way every morning before they go down to breakfast they would assist in the household work, and also greatly benefit their health.

When ready to make the bed brush the mattress, and dust round the bedstead. Reserve the position of the mattress daily so as to ensure equal wear. There is nothing quite so uncomfortable as a mattress denting in the centre from constant pressure. Use the carpet beater once a week.

A bed to be comfortable requires careful making. The old adage, "As a man makes his bed, so must he lie upon it," has a great deal of uncomfortable literal truth when only hurry and inattention to creases goes to the making of one's night resting place. The proper procedure is as follows: Tuck in the underblankets firmly, pulling it free from all rucks. Place the under-sheet as straight and as tautly as possible. Put the bolster and pillows in position, with the fastening slips facing the wall. Add the top sheet, leaving a good margin at the head of the bed. Tuck in the blankets. Fold the extra length of sheet over the top of the blanket. Put the counterpane on carefully so that it hangs evenly. The night-garments can be folded, laid in their cases, and placed at the head of the bed; but the most hygienic method is to put them on a coat hanger and hook them up in a cupboard. The bedroom window should of course, be left wide open until bedtime, and then closed to within two or three inches both top and bottom.

## MAYOR GAYNOR'S BODY IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The body of William J. Gaynor, mayor of New York, who died at sea September 16, lay to-day in the privacy of his Brooklyn home. In a drizzling rain it was lowered at four o'clock this morning from the high decks of the liner Lusitania to the city's boat Corroction. Through a mist that lay heavy over the harbor, the Corroction steamed an hour and a half later to a pier at the battery. There a picked squad of one hundred police, standing all night in the rain, formed its escort to Brooklyn.

The body will remain at the Gaynor home until to-morrow night. A private funeral service will be held there to-morrow afternoon, and at the conclusion the body will be taken to the city hall, where it will lie in state till Monday morning when funeral services will be held in Trinity church.

### DR. GRENFELL WILL BE BEST MAN.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 20.—Dr. Wilfrid T. Grenfell, head of the Labrador mission for deep sea fishermen, will act as best man for Francis B. Sayre, when he is married to the President's daughter, Miss Jessie Wilson, at the White House on November 25, it is said. Dr. and Mrs. Grenfell are expected in Philadelphia in a few days. They are planning to spend the winter in England.
