OBSEQUIES HELD FOR REV. DONALD MCKINNON

With all the impressive ceremonies of the Catholic Church which as a priest he served so faithfully, the remains of the Rev. D. J. McKinnon were laid in their last resting place in St. Michael's Cemetery, Liverpool, Saturday morning, August 28. Friends gathered from far and near to pay a final tribute to his memory, and long before the hour appointed for the services the spacious and magnificent edifice he had raised to the glory of God was crowded to the doors.

During the services all business was suspended in Liverpool and the flag over the Town Hall was placed at half-mast as a symbol of the grief of the community over the early demise of one who was not only a good and faithful priest but also a loyal and devoted citizen.

The Solemn Requiem High Mass was sung in the presence of Archbishop Hanna, by Dr. P. N. Morrison of Berkeley, assisted by Rev. John A. Lally as deacon and Rev. Owen Lacey as sub-deacon. Msgr. James P. Cantwell acted as master of ceremonies. After Mass was celebrated, Archbishop Edward J. Hanna preached an eloquent and touching eulogy over the departed and few eyes were unimpaired by tears as His Grace recounted the life story and unfolded the deeds of love and sacrifice of one who was always ready to spend himself on behalf of his brethren—of one who was ever eager to forget his own infirmities in ministering to the infirmities of his fellow-men.

The funeral cortege was the largest witnessed in Liverpool since the death of Rev. Patrick Power, and as it wended its way to the cemetery many were reminded of a similar bereavement in the parish more than five years ago. Members of the Y. M. I. who are also members of the American Legion acted as pallbearers. The procession was headed by the children of St. Michael's School and the Sisters of St. Dominic, followed by members of the Y. M. I., Y. L. I., Dora Inez Council, S. P. R. S. I., and members of the congregation and friends.

On arrival at the cemetery, the last prayers were recited by Archbishop Hanna, and the remains were reverently laid to rest amidst the tears of those who, Catholic and Protestant alike, knew Father McKinnon as a devoted friend, a loyal citizen and an ornament to the Church of which he was such a distinguished member.

The late Father McKinnon was a native of Prince Edward Island, Canada, where he was born in 1874. Like many another sterling son of the Island, he was called by God to the sacred priesthood and studied at St. Francis Xavier College in his native diocese. He entered St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, where he was ordained for the archdiocese of San Francisco in 1898. His

brilliant mind as well as his noble heart, attracted the attention of the late Archbishop Riordan who sent Father McKinnon to the Catholic University at Washington where he pursued a post-graduate course for two years. Father McKinnon's first appointment in the diocese was at St. James' Church as assistant to the Rev. P. J. Lynch. His health failing, Father McKinnon was obliged to spend several years in Redlands and Arizona, where he recuperated and was appointed pastor of Morgan Hill on his return. He built a

very pretty church and parochial residence there, and in 1915 was promoted to the pastorate of Liverpool at the death of Father Power. At Liverpool Father McKinnon did notable work for the upbuilding of the parish. When the old frame church was destroyed by fire in 1918, he completely rehabilitated the parish by building a complete ecclesiastical plant. A beautiful concrete church in Mission style was erected, as well as a commodious residence. The greatest addition to the parish was the splendid new convent and school built for the Dominican Sisters. Father McKinnon's untimely passing at the early age of 45 years is deeply lamented by a wide circle of friends among the priests, religious and laity. His scholarly mind, his beautiful character and priestly zeal endeared him to hosts of people who pray eternal rest to the soul of this good priest. He is survived by his wife, Francis, and Mary McKinnon, both of Prince Edward Island, and several sisters and brothers. Sister of Oakland, William H. McKinnon of Liverpool and W. McKinnon of Prince Edward Island. Rev. Bessie and McKinnon, pastor of St. Sebastian, is a cousin of the deceased. The Monitor.

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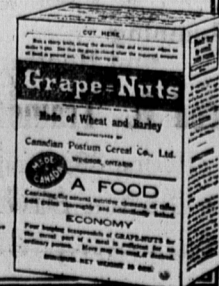
