P. E. I. Hospital Annual Meeting

(Continued from Page One.)

Queens and Kings Counties that we must continue year after year to have the support they have given us this year if the Hospital is to be kept up to a high state of efficiency without increasing our rates.

Hospitals all over this continent are reporting huge deficits on this year's work, and some have been seriously considering reducing their accommodation for non-paying patients; a most serious thing for the poor people. There is no need of this taking place here; all we need is a moderate subscription each year from everyone and we will have no financial worries.

With this in view we wish to announce to the public that we have decided to make an appeal each year on November 1st to the people of the two Counties. In the country this will be done through school district organization and no other appeal made by anyone or at any other time of the year will be authorized by us.

We must also ask you to bear in mind that not only must present day expenses be met, but that we must be prepared to meet the demand for more and better hospital accommodation as it arrives. We have thought well to include in this year's printed report a brief history of the hospital and a perusal of this will show how different Trustee Boards anticipated and met the requirements of the people which they were only able to do through the many splendid donations made by different parties.

Within the year a complete change has been made in the administration staff. Upon the retirement of Miss Turner we appointed Miss Louise McKinnon, one of our own graduates, as Lady Superintendent, and this position she has filled to the entire satisfaction of the Trustees, and we believe of everyone who has had anything to do with the Hospital. The work of the past year has been the heaviest in our history, and Miss McKinnon carried on through the year without a responsible assistant. Feeling that this was more than any one person could stand, we have in the interests of the Institution appointed Miss Annie McKinnon as head nurse and she will also look after the patients' accounts. In November last Miss Kilburn who had so efficiently filled the position of housekeeper since 1914, tendered her resignation, and her position was filled by the appointment of Mrs. Jean Inglis, who took charge about February 1st of this year. Mrs. Inglis has already clearly demonstrated her ability to fill the position with the result that we feel justified in reporting tonight that the management in all departments of the Hospital has never been in better hands.

Receipts.

During the year we had 637 patients as again 487 the previous year, an increase of 150. Patients' fees were \$15,298.78, as against \$10,431.01 the previous year, an increase of \$4,867.77. Total receipts, all sources \$28,949.56. Total expenditures \$29,578.15. Comparing the cost of different items with the previous year, we find: Coal cost us \$4,892.76. An increase of \$1,892.70. Groceries cost \$5,510.78. An increase of \$1,482.43. Meat and fish, an increase of \$321.78. Medicines, an increase of \$804.14. Salaries \$4,983.76. An increase of \$476.76.

The total expenditure for running expenses was \$23,894.68. Our Endowment Fund has been increased by \$400 through a legacy from the late Miss Sarah Doherty. The following nurses graduated: Miss Helen MacLean, Miss Emma Gordon, Miss Helen Compton, Miss Bessie Weatherbie, Miss Hattie Jelly, Miss Lillian Bruce.

It is with a feeling of deepest sorrow that we have to record the death during the year of two of our nurses. Miss Amy Toombs, of North Justice, who entered the Hospital for training on September 1st, 1917, died November 12, 1918. Miss Margaret McLeod died ten days after entering as a probationer. King Ludwig Becoming Insane

(Special to The Guardian.) GENEVA, May 29.—The aged Ludwig, former King of Bavaria, is showing signs of insanity, which is hereditary in the former royal family. An expert in mental diseases arrived on Tuesday at Zeizers, near Coire, from Munich. The aged monarch has been residing in Switzerland since the middle of last month.

Ludwig, during violent fits, declares that Bavaria won the war, and says he wants to return to Munich in triumph at the head of his victorious army.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, May 29.—The Canadian force in Northern Russia has been recalled. It is about 600 strong and consists chiefly of an artillery brigade commanded by Col. Sharman. The Canadians who have done splendid work against the Bolsheviks, will return to Canada via the Pacific coast.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. BENJAMIN HEARTZ.

After a long life, several years beyond the allotted span, the gentle spirit of Mrs. Benjamin Hertz passed yesterday into the keeping of Him who gave it. Before her marriage she was Miss Henrietta V. Davison, daughter of Mr. William B. Davison. She was born in Charlottetown and resided here all her life, with the exception of visits abroad. By her passing the last member of an honored family has gone to the eternal rest. Mrs. Hertz was blessed with a splendid constitution, and only about a month ago her failing health indicated that the end was approaching. She was a cultured lady, of a rarely attractive personality. To know her even casually, was to respect her, and to know her intimately was to love her. In this city and beyond its limits she had a large circle of friends and admirers, all of whom will sincerely deplore her demise. In social life, Mrs. Hertz was very prominent for many years, her graciousness of manner, her unflinching cheer and alert mind making her ever welcome. She was noted for her deeds of charity, her kindness being usually extended quietly and unostentatiously, and the poor of this city will learn with deep sorrow that her generous heart is still forever. Friendliness was one of her chief characteristics, and this combined with her womanly graces, her unselfishness and thoughtfulness for others endeared her to all. She is nearly the last of her day and generation amongst the ladies of this city. Mr. Hertz predeceased her over 14 years ago, his death having occurred December 28, 1904. For the past five years she had been living with her son, Mr. Frank R., at his residence, Beaconsfield. Besides her son and granddaughter, Miss Ruth, other relatives are left to cherish her memory. The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon, the services beginning at 2.10. The procession will leave the house at 2.30 for the People's Cemetery.
