Winfield Stratton is of good conformation; he stands 15 1/2; weighs 1050 lbs; has a nice kind disposition; his shoulders are strongly put on; wide between the fore legs, with full breast, thick through the heart; short back with strong coupling; ribs well sprung; his tail and head are both put on right; his legs and feet are first class, his color bay, black points, only white, is less than two inches on each hind coronet. He is a pacer that goes at that gait all the time, except that he walks square. He wears no boots on the road and races without boots on mile rings, but on half mile tracks wears boots in front, but none behind.

# THE JOHNSON FARM

**THE JOHNSON FARM**, says an exchange notices at the foot of the Blue Hills of Massachusetts. A visitor can get to it, or rather near to it, by tramcar from Boston; but the way the writer went was by railway to Readville, thence by wagon to the farm. The farm, on account of its associations, is one of the most interesting in New England, it being the celebrated Forbes farm and thither the late Mr. Forbes took Arthur 2.10, to high wheel sulky at two years old, paying for him the extraordinary price of \$125,000. The colt afterwards reduced his record to 2.07 1/2. Mr. Forbes paid the same year \$15,000 for Starlight then two years old. As a four year old Starlight was given a record of 2.15 1/2, also to high wheel sulky. She was then retired to the brood mare ranks and Achille 2.14 is one of the few ones living of her foals. The mare is high strung and scolding and was "unlucky" with her foals and at foaling time was said to be frightful. We do not know what happened to her first foal but she nearly tramped Achille to death, and succeeded in hurting one of his hind legs. Later, when two years old, Achille got kicked on the same leg, the mark of which can yet be seen by an expert, or felt by the hand. Achille had shown wonderful speed with a training as a two year old, but when he got hurt Mr. Forbes came to the conclusion that the get of Starlight was hoodooed and sold the colt and there by sold one of the best begotten at this celebrated farm. We saw Starlight when at the Johnson farm. She is a large, well formed, brown mare, larger than her notable son, Achille 2.14. She was then with foal by Bligen 2.00 1/2. It is hardly necessary to state that both Arion 2.07 1/2, and Starlight 2.15 1/2, are by the great son of Ryndy's Hamiltonian and Greece Mountain Maid, Electioneer 15, the sire of over 100 in the 2.30 list, very few of whom are pacers. We did not see many of the young stock as the greater number were at Mr. Johnston's home in Ontario, but those of them that were at the Johnson farm were what one would expect to find from such parents. # WINTER SERVICE OF THE ISLAND

## Island Members not Satisfied With the Montcalm—A Breezy Discussion.

**OTTAWA, May 24.**—The House went into supply and Mr. Martin, Prince Edward Island, raised the question of a winter steamship service for Northumberland Strait. Mr. Prefontaine, last fall, visited Charlottetown and told the people there that a boat of 5,000 horse power would be built expressly for the Prince Edward Island service. It was now stated officially that the ship under construction would be only 2,500 horse power. An expert had been brought from England to draft the plans of the proposed ship, but his plans had been thrown aside. It further appeared that even the smaller and weaker new ship would not be placed on the Island route. The statement was made that she would be sent elsewhere and the Montcalm, which is inferior to the previous service, put on.

Mr. Brodeur said the Montcalm was a better ship than Mr. Martin supposed. She was all right and had done good service breaking ice on the St. Lawrence. Mr. Martin then why not keep her there?

Mr. Brodeur—The Montcalm is the best boat there is in America. It had been charged that the Montcalm was extravagantly fitted out. Now they want more money spent. The Montcalm had 4,800 horse power. Mr. Lefurgey said the indicated horse power of the Montcalm was 3,400 or only 1,000 more than the boat formerly on the route. The Montcalm was not all that was promised. This was a clear case of breach of faith, one of many where the government had been guilty in respect to Prince Edward Island.
