In fact we have had an increase in this expenditure of \$6,732.47. This however, was more than taken care of by an increase in Government grants, which for the past year amounted to \$10,000. The united action of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities at their 1939 Convention, for the meeting this Council was represented by Councilor Chandler and myself. During the first years of Direct Relief there was a scheme in force by which the City was paid two-thirds of the money expended. Since 1937 this practice was discontinued and we had to be satisfied with what we could get; but matters were evened by increased grants for work projects. These were of inestimable value in aiding the unemployed and helping to build up and beautify our City. Such projects as the Government Pond, Park Roadway, Port Edward, Rebuilding Park Breastwork, extending of Spring Park Culvert, the Richmond Street breastwork and many others would never have been started had the City to face the full cost. By the new scheme beginning April 1st, 1939 the City's share of the cost of Direct Relief is only 20 per cent. This is a step in the right direction, but we should keep in mind that the Dominion Government takes over the whole problem.

Civic Airport

"In this connection I might also mention the Charlottetown Airport. This project was likewise undertaken by the Dominion Government, and although it is not yet employed, and although it is not yet up to our expectations, nevertheless gave as good a return for the money expended, as any of the relief work so far undertaken. There has been \$98,710.00 spent on this Airport by the Federal Government. With the knowledge of this fact, and the willingness to co-operate with the Federal Government, we offered the free use of it to them for the duration of the war. This offer has been accepted by a Historic Parade and Defence Departments, but as yet no decision has been taken.

Charlottetown Honored

"Charlottetown has been honored in the past by visits from many prominent people, but 1939 is outstanding in this respect. On the 14th we had the pleasure of entertaining a Royal Welcome to Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth. This was the first time a reigning Sovereign visited our Dominion, and our citizens were naturally elated, when it was known that the City was included in their itinerary. Citizens and school children from every part of the province turned out in thousands to pay tribute to their Majesties and the City was replete with bunting and decoration. Addresses of welcome from the City and Province were presented in the Confederation Chamber and a State dinner was given at Government House, where many prominent citizens were present to their Majesties. Pain at frequent intervals marred the festivities, but the day will long be remembered by those who participated and will go down in history as the most important event since Incorporation.

"Many other people of importance visited our City during the year and were fittingly received and entertained. These included Lieut. Governor L. O. Harrow and Miss Barrow of Maine; Lieut. Gov. E. L. Patenaude, Quebec; Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Finance and National Revenue; Hon. T. M. Brunswick, Premier of New Brunswick; Hon. J. Macdonald, Nova Scotia; Hon. J. L. Riley, Federal Minister National Revenue; Premier John Bracken and Mrs. Bracken of Manitoba; Hon. T. A. Cramer, Federal Minister of Mines and Resources, Ottawa; and Hon. C. D. Howe, Federal Minister of Transport. It is always a pleasure to have such distinguished guests and we trust they enjoyed their stay and will return again in the near future.

Livestock

MONTREAL, Feb. 12 (CP)—Livestock offerings were light today on the Montreal markets, the Dominion Department of Agriculture reported. Cattle receipts were 491, calves 342, sheep 81 and hogs 168.

Cattle were firm to 25 cents higher and calves were about .50 higher than the close of last week. Good steers were \$7.25 to \$7.75, medium \$6.25 to \$7.25 and common \$4.50 to 6. Heifers ranged from 4 to \$6.50 with an odd sale a shade higher, medium cows were \$4.50 to \$5 and common \$3.75 to \$4.25. Canners and cutters were \$3 to \$3.50. Good bulls made \$5.25 to \$5.50 and common from \$4 to \$5.25.

Due to light offering calves were 50 cents higher than the close of the week. Good veals made \$11 with mediums around \$10.50 and the bulk of the veals were sold in mixed lots at around \$10. Very common light veals sold down to \$8. Drinkers were \$6 to \$8 and grassers \$4.50 to \$6, mostly \$4.50.

Good cows were steady. Most of the lambs offered were bucks and brought \$8.50. Sheep were from \$5 to \$6.50 with the bulk of the sales between \$5.25 and \$6.

There were no early sales of hogs.

Historic Event

"Another event of historic importance which took place in July was the observance of the seventy-fifth anniversary of Confederation. This was celebrated in a manner befitting the occasion and was an outstanding success. The high spots of the festival were marked by a Historic Parade and a Grand Reunion of the early days; the Fireman's Tournament, a Mardi Gras on the Market Square. Fireworks, Yacht Races, swimming events and the opening of our National Park at Cavendish. It was a week crowded with entertainment and old alike much enjoyed by those who were responsible for planning and carrying out this wonderful program.

Many conventions and notable gatherings took place here during the past summer, which speaks well for our hospitality and means more to the City. Some of the most important were the Halifax Curling Club Bonspiel, Rotary Convention, Maritime Rifle Association Meet, Girl Guides Convention, Marine Ladies Golf Tournament, and Canadian Natcom Silver Fox Breeders annual meeting. Visitors will always find an open door and kindly welcome in Charlottetown.

"The presence of a larger number of ships than usual in our harbor, especially during Confederation Week, was a great deal to the success of the occasion. Our citizens never lost an opportunity of showing their appreciation of the presence of both officers and men, and this was warmly reciprocated.

"This Council was pleased to attend our regular meeting in May. They were informed that we would be happy to co-operate with them in every way possible, for the betterment of Civic Government. Clean-up Week was a result of this visit and was quite a success, but we would have been glad had this interest continued and not allowed to die during the coming year of election. Doubtless, however, the unsettled condition of world affairs was partly the cause for this. I hope the coming year will see the new Council will see better results from this source.

"Events worthy of notice were the presentations of the Royal Canadian Humane Association Bronze Medal to Thaddeus Knockwood of Lennox Island, for heroic action in the rescue of Harold E. Moore of this City from a derelict engine at Bloomfield, P. E. I. and the Fireman's Long Service Medal to Fire Chief Angus McEachern for twenty-five years continuous service in the Charlottetown Fire Department. Some weeks later our esteemed citizen, Dr. H. D. Johnson was similarly honored by the Society of the Last Post Fund for many years of devoted Service. He was presented with the Insignia of the Society and made a life member. All these awards were popular and richly deserved.

Free Gardens

"I feel I would be remiss in my duty were I not to mention the excellent work of Messrs. A. L. Wright and A. J. Haslam in superintending the work of the Free Gardens. They have given good service and obtained splendid results. Receiving no remuneration, their endeavors are highly appreciated by all our citizens. I hope the coming year will see an endeavour to keep this project alive, as it has paid good dividends so far and these will continue to increase.

"During the year Charlottetown has lost two of her esteemed citizens in the passing of Mr. Hugh F. Connors and Mr. Charles Warry. Mr. Connors has given good service at the Council Board and was for many years on the Board of

Water Commissioners, which position he held at the time of his death. Mr. Warry was the Engineer in charge of the Market and Library and a very capable and courteous civil servant. Both these gentlemen will be greatly missed and their families have our sincere sympathy.

"The unsettled condition of affairs in the City Clerk's office, due to the External audit and the installation of a new accounting system, made it very difficult to carry on the business of the City during the past year. These changes necessitated larger office room and we were obliged to remodel the City Clerk's office. For this purpose, added to this was the work of the Tax Adjustment Board, the Appeal Board and finally preparation for the Election. With all these impediments the Finance Committee had a difficult time finishing the year's work. The annual statement shows a deficit of \$33,846 or about \$13,906.92 more than the previous year. This is due to placing \$37,425.16 in the Sinking Fund which was the amount called for in the Auditors' report and \$13,425.16 more than in 1938. Had the Sinking Fund allotment been the same as last year our position would show an improvement of \$2,118.24. Councilor Chandler's report deals with these matters in detail and he and his Committee are to be highly commended for their excellent work all through the term.

No Permanent Streets Laid

"There were no permanent streets laid during the year, but a great deal of patching was done all over the City. In some sections whole blocks had to be replaced. Some new sidewalks were put down and street maintenance was well looked after. Councilor Hennessey and his Committee have done good work.

"A large program was carried out under the head of Public Property and all those projects undertaken through Unemployment Relief were looked after by Councilor Blanchard and his Committee. All this work was completed in a satisfactory manner and reflects great credit to the Committee in charge.

"The Employment and Relief Committee are doing better work every year. There is a thankless job requiring time and patience, but their duties were well performed. I think I can say there was a minimum of complaint, the work being well distributed and relief food good. Councilor Lapthorn and his Committee may be well pleased with the results obtained.

In Praise of Police

"You have reason to be proud of the Police Force and the manner in which it functions, under the capable supervision of Chief Constable Storey, an outbreak of crime has not been one breach of discipline during the whole year. Councilor McIntyre and his Committee are to be credited for handling this Department in such an efficient manner.

"Councilor Dougan, Chairman of the Tender and Market Committee, has attended to his duties faithfully and well. The Market and Rest Rooms bear testimony to this, and those who frequent them have good reason to appreciate the work of this Committee.

No Serious Fire

"That there were no serious fires

this year is due to the efficiency and skill of Chief McEachern and his men and I commend them for their attention to duty. The Tournament held during Confederation Week was a big drawing card and added greatly to the success of that Celebration. Councilor McKee and his Committee gave this department close co-operation at all times.

"Deputy Mayor Holman has been of great assistance in helping me carry on my duties. He has been ever ready to work in whatever capacity his aid was required and as a member of the Finance and Police Committees his experience was always valuable.

"The Water and Sewerage System is well taken care of by Chairman J. A. Webster and his associates. Mr. G. D. Wright and the other members of the Finance Committee have been previously alluded to. We are very fortunate in having Mr. J. A. McMillan as manager of this Department as the annual report will show.

"There have been several meetings of the Board of Health during the last two years and some important matters have been passed. I feel it was in the interest of the citizens that this Board should function more efficiently. The Health Officer Dr. B. C. Keeling, Meat and Milk Inspector Dr. I. E. Croken and the Sanitary Officer Mr. W. Reardon look after their important duties in a highly commendable manner and good work has been accomplished.

Sincere Thanks

"To the members of this Council I wish to tender my sincere thanks for all the help and kindness extended me during my term of office. Had it not been for your encouragement and help there were times when I felt I might not have been able to carry on. You have done much to build and beautify our City and strengthen its financial structure. I regret I will not be writing you concerning these improvements farther. Nevertheless I shall always take a keen interest in your work, and I know there will be a sufficient number of you in the next Council to insure a fair and unprejudiced trial for the new system that has been installed, which I believe is all that is necessary to prove its success.

"In closing I wish to convey my thanks to our citizens and assure them that I appreciate the honor they have conferred on me. I have at all times endeavored to merit their confidence by working in their best interests. Neither do I forget the faithful service of all the civic officials. They have performed their duties exceptionally well under trying conditions and were worthy of every commendation the citizens can pay them. The City Clerk, Mr. J. A. Fullerton and City Foreman Mr. J. Y. Reddin are both measuring up to all expectations and there was no mistake made in these new appointments. I sincerely hope that the improvements made during the past two years may bring forth good fruit. His Worship concluded.
