"Our Island Dead"
A SPLENDID MEMORIAL
Attracted by the announcement that a memorial to the men of the Valleyfield Presbyterian Congregation who fell while serving in "Freedom's Cause" in the World's Greatest War was to be unveiled, we took the opportunity of journeying there by auto. It was on the ninth of July, a glorious summer day and the drive was most enjoyable,—through Southport to Tea Hill, from which there bursts upon the view the dancing waters of the straits with the sunlight on them. Between us and the sea was a scene of quiet pastoral beauty, and beyond, bathed in a soft haze, the islets that are planted as sentinels at the entrance to our magnificent and commodious harbor. Our eyes were filled with beauty and our hearts with delight as we gazed on the wonderful panorama of sea and sky, of trees and fields rich in promise, that is spread here for all who have eyes clear enough to take it in. We in this Province live near beauty spots and we cannot travel far without feeling the truth of the words:—"Breathes there the man, with soul who never to himself hath said, This is my own, my native land."
We at last passed the old Valleyfield Church, a landmark for some generations, which could with advantage to the picturesque scene be removed, and reached the new edifice which is visible for miles around and is a fitting expression of the desire ever present in the devout heart of the highlander—to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. Everything spoke of peace and yet we were assembled to commemorate the lives of those who paid war's sad price.
The Rev. Dr. McEwen was the Chairman and opened the service with devotional exercises and remarks which were well suited to the occasion. He was followed by Chaplain Taylor who spoke eloquently of the sacrifices that had been made, and of the beauty of the service they were rendering that day. He emphasized the need of re-dedication on the part of those present without which their fine tribute would lose much of its value. Who more fitted to take part in such a service than one who in addition to ministering to the sick and the dying on the battlefield, reverently, tenderly, lovingly looked after the dead for their own brave sakes, and that of the bereaved ones far away?
Dr. Fullerton then followed with an impressive address on the value of the sacrifice made by "these shining boys of ours." "Redeemers all of them, if the cross be true"—he cried. He also added words of comfort for those whose wounds were re-opened by the service in which they were engaged.
Rev. Dr. McEwen then proceeded to the left of the pulpit where the memorial tablet has been placed and unveiled it to the glory of God and in honored memory of

Mr. Taylor offered the dedicatory prayer at the conclusion of which Dr. McEwen said:—"As representing those to whom the custody of this memorial is now committed, I accept and take over this tablet to be preserved with all reverent care, and in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ I dedicate it to the Glory of God and in proud and loving memory of our noble dead. The service was then closed with praise and the benediction, after which the Congregation inspected the memorial, which is truly an excellent addition to the ornamentation of a very beautiful church.
The memorial is a very handsome mural tablet, 5 feet by 9 feet, set in a magnificent oak frame finished in dark with light golden oak backing on the wall. The design is of the
