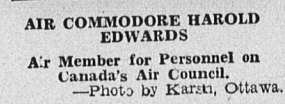

Now costs LESS! CREATE POLISH ARMED FORCES IN CANADA. OTTAWA April 7 - (CP) - In a joint declaration signed late Saturday by Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Gen. Wladyslaw Sikorski, Prime Minister of Poland, it was formally announced that arrangements have been made for the formation of a Polish force in Canada for ultimate co-operation in the establishment of this force which, after a period of training in Canada, will join the armed forces of the Polish nation.

CANADIAN AIRWAYS LIMITED

Announcement of Withdrawal from the Maritimes. April 7, 1941.

TO THE PUBLIC OF THE MARITIMES: In 1940 Canadian Airways Limited signed two contracts for four years with the Post Office Department, Ottawa, for the carriage of mails:

(a) From Moncton to Halifax, St. John, Summerside, and Charlottetown. (b) From Charlottetown to Magdalen Islands during the winter months.

This necessitated the Company purchasing modern, high speed equipment, the choice of which was limited by the smallness of the airports at Halifax and St. John. The type of equipment most suitable was the Model 18A twin-engine Beechcraft having comparable performance with the Electra 14 operated by T.C.A. The total investment in two aircraft, radio and other facilities necessitated by this contract was approximately \$200,000.00.

Although these Beechcraft were limited to six passengers, extra schedules were operated to take care of overflow passengers when there were sufficient to warrant it, and the Company at its own expense inaugurated a Sunday schedule to take care of passengers from the Sunday schedule of T.C.A., and carried mail offered free of charge. Operations of this nature must have mail revenue and passengers to be profitable and, even under these conditions, it takes considerable time to build up a profitable operation.

In 1940 our net loss in the Maritimes was \$17,636.16, but we were hopeful that we would show a profit in time.

On March 15, 1941, the Postmaster General advised the Company that as at April 15, 1941, T.C.A. would take over our operations between Moncton and Halifax. This action was taken by virtue of a clause in the contract reading as follows:

"The Postmaster General also reserves the right to annul this agreement on thirty days' written notice to the contractors whenever, in his opinion, the public interest shall require it."

The cancelled portion of our contract represents over 35 per cent of the Company's entire revenue in the Maritimes.

As the loss of the Moncton-Halifax operation and the continuance of the other routes would not enable us to appreciably reduce our overhead, we were faced with the prospect of such heavy losses that we were forced to advise the Post Office Department that we would be unable to continue any operations after April 15 unless we were adequately compensated in some other way. The Department then advised us "that after due consideration of all the facts" we would be relieved of all Maritime contracts as of April 15th, 1941. In view of this the Company has no alternative but to withdraw entirely from the Maritimes after serving the public there continuously for thirteen years.

Our Company has a staff of twenty-seven efficient and loyal employees in the Maritimes, of whom all but three are natives of the district in which they have been working. We are absorbing the whole of this staff at other points in our service. Our other obligations in the Maritimes will also be taken care of.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation of the support and patronage given us by the public and the various administrative bodies during our stay in the Maritimes. There will be general regret on the part of all members of our Maritimes staff at leaving to take up their homes in other parts of Canada, and the Company joins with them in saying that we are all sorry we cannot continue to serve the public further in the Maritimes.

Stock Note

Edison Mutch, prominent Jersey breeder at North River, Prince Edward Island, has purchased the richly bred Jersey bull, Wendybrook Hector - 102529 - from W. Elmo Ashton, Frazier, Quebec. This bull was born in September and will be Mr. Mutch's future herd sire.

He is the first bull to ever go to the Maritime Provinces carrying the blood of the world's record Jersey cow, Brampton Basilia, with a record of 19,012 lbs. of milk and 1-313 lbs. of fat, and with a life time total production of 100,003 lbs. of milk and 6,394 lbs. of fat.

The sire of Mr. Mutch's new bull is Brampton Royal Basia, and he is son of Brampton Lady Basilia, a daughter of the world's record cow, Brampton Lady Basilia has a three year old record of 13,698 lbs. of milk and 910 lbs. of fat, and is the Canadian champion in the three year old class. She has just finished a four year old record and is now on test as a Brampton Aim Basilia, that has just finished a junior two year old record of 649 lbs. of fat, making three generations of production that is probably not equaled anywhere in the world for three Jersey cows.

The dam of Mr. Mutch's bull is on test in one of the outstanding herds in Quebec and is making a splendid record. She is a daughter of the grand champion bull, Gables Forward Star, that is rated as one of the outstanding younger sires of the breed, and is at the head
