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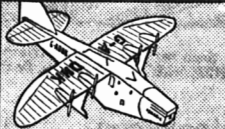

No land was included in the original offer. \$1,935 being the compensation in full. The final settlement, as stated yesterday, is for \$3,000 plus a twenty-one year lease on certain terms and with option of renewal on two acres of land immediately behind the one and a half acres to be vacated, with the right of way to the shore front.

In Memoriam

MR. THOMAS HAMMILL

On May 14th last, there passed away at Seven Mile Bay after a lingering illness, Thomas Hammill at the advanced age of 86 years. The deceased was born in Middleton, P.E.I. He later moved to Free-town where he spent a few years

after which he came to Seven Mile Bay, where until his death, he was engaged in his usual occupation farming. He was always a man of strong Christian faith and sentiment, of sober and industrious habits, forever aiming to exemplify in no ostentatious manner, thrift, honesty and integrity. Potato Seed Treatment

(Experimental Farms Note) After carefully selecting the seed stock to eliminate misshapen, rotten or blemished tubers, disinfecting it is a further safeguard in producing a profitable potato crop, states J.L. Howatt, Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology, Fredericton, N.B.

Two commonly occurring potato diseases, rhizoctonia and common scab, are often responsible for lowering the grade of an otherwise marketable potato crop. The organisms causing these diseases are tuber-borne, and they can be killed by proper disinfection of the seed stock. It must be borne in mind, however, that such treatment does not prevent infection of the new crop if the potatoes are planted in soil or rhizoctonia infested soil. Experiments conducted by the Division of Botany indicate that seed treatment eliminating the surface-borne organisms causing these diseases, resulting in a higher and more uniform germination, a more vigorous stand of vines, and a more notable increase in yield. Seed treatment of whole potatoes may be carried out any time while
