Former Islander Chosen Honor Man at C. M. T. C.

WORCESTER, Mass., Aug. 3.—Edward Bond Gallant, son of James F. Gallant of 25 Alvarado avenue and a junior at Holy Cross college, shared first honors with John DeMille of Newton, a Williams college student and nephew of Cecil DeMille motion picture producer in the Citizens' Military Training camp, Fort Adams, Newport, R. I., during the past month. He returned home yesterday with a certificate showing that in the opinion of the 26 officers at the post he and DeMille were the leaders of the 500 cadets enrolled. First honors Gallant also divided equally with DeMille in the Camp association contest for the most soldierly student. Medals were given each winner. In the leadership contest where the prizes offered were \$50 for first place, \$30 for second and \$20 for third the first two prizes were split and each boy was given \$40 in gold.

Other local boys winning honors at the training camp were Joseph R. Rogers, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph R. Rogers of 60 Downing St., and a sophomore at Worcester Polytechnic institute and Curtis Andrews of 1001 Main Street who was graduated from South High School last June. Joseph Rogers was awarded the Vanderbilt medal for life saving and the gold medal for bar vaulting. Curtis Andrews gained his honors in track work. Sundown "Eclipse" Shows More Value

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The "Eclipse" race at Sundown marks an important stage of the racing season, and is also a social affair which seldom fails to attract to Esher one of the most fashionable crowds of the season. The English race course, especially distinguished by the presence of the King and Queen. The recent race marked a new record in race values—a record previously held by Sansovino's Derby of 1924, when the Syndford colt reared by Lord Derby with 11,755 sovereigns.

These records were exceeded now by some 560 sovereigns. The field would have been decidedly below the average in point of class but for the presence of Coronach and Lex and Proteus (who came over from France with the character of having greatly improved) were "there" for about six furlongs, but by last cross bow and Commander King had taken the measure. This is the second occasion upon which Lord Woodington has won the Eclipse, the first occurring in 1901, when he raced as "Kincaid". He had paid Lord Rosebery £1,050 for Epson Lad, which was ridden in the race by Gomez, and that season the gelding won over £20,000 in stakes, while his owner won £7,611 in the list of successful owners with nearly £29,000, and Fred Darling, as a winning trainer, passes Alex Taylor and the Hon. George Lambton, and appears likely to remain at the head of the list.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Two women's world athletic records have been broken. Miss Gump, of the Mitcham Athletic Club, Mitcham, Surrey, has beaten the world's previous record for a four jump 17 feet 1/2 inches, by jumping 18 feet in the British games at Stamford Bridge. Miss Gump of the London Olympians, in the sports at Chiswick, has broken her own world's record for a high jump, 5 feet by clearing 5 feet 1 1/2 inches.
