## THE MARITIME WINTER FAIR TO BE HELD AT AMHERST

The List of Speakers and Their Subjects—Many Prominent Specialists to Speak on Timely Topics of Interest to Farmers, Dairymen and Stockmen—The Judges in Various Lines.

Professor Jas. W. Robertson, Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying, will be one of the speakers at the Convention in connection with the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst on the 16th, 17th and 18th of next month. His subject will be "Improvement in Farm Practices," and promises a treat to all who are interested in the great advances already made and in prospect in farm methods.

Archibald McNellie, of Glasgow, one of the best live stock authorities in Scotland, Editor of the Scottish Farm, and Secretary of the Clydesdale Association of Scotland, will deliver addresses on the following subjects:—"Canadian live stock products exported to Great Britain and suggestions how to improve that trade, dealing with horses, cattle, sheep, and bacon, also dairy products." "The breeding of heavy horses with particular reference to the co-operative system in use in Great Britain."

F. W. Hodson, Live Stock Commissioner will speak on "Organized effort" dealing with the work accomplished during the past year, especially in connection with our Agricultural Association and Farmers' Institutes.

Duncan Anderson of Rugby, Ont., one of the most successful farmers of that province will judge beef cattle and will also judge the beef carcass and deliver an address thereon.

Prof. J. H. Grisdale, Agriculturist of

the Dominion Experimental Farm will judge the sheep and deliver an address in the ring outlining the desirable and undesirable points of a mutton sheep dealing with both wool and body. He will also judge the sheep carcasses and deliver an address pointing out the requirements of the market in this respect.

J. E. Brethour, the well known Yorkshire breeder will judge the pigs and will deliver an address outlining the requirements of the market for bacon pigs; he will judge the carcasses and point out the desirable and undesirable qualities.

Prof. H. H. Dean, Professor of Dairying at the Ontario Agricultural College will deliver an address dealing with the founding, maintaining and care of a dairy herd; he will also deliver illustrated addresses showing the desirable and undesirable points of a dairy cow.

F. C. Hare, Chief of the Poultry Division, Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa, will discuss the many questions arising in the profitable breeding, management, and marketing of poultry and eggs.

A number of the leading meat dealers and other local gentlemen interested in live stock development will also be upon the program.

The Secretary of the Association, having engagements which require his absence from the Maritime Provinces, the work of the Secretary's office has all been transferred from St. John to the President's office at Amherst. 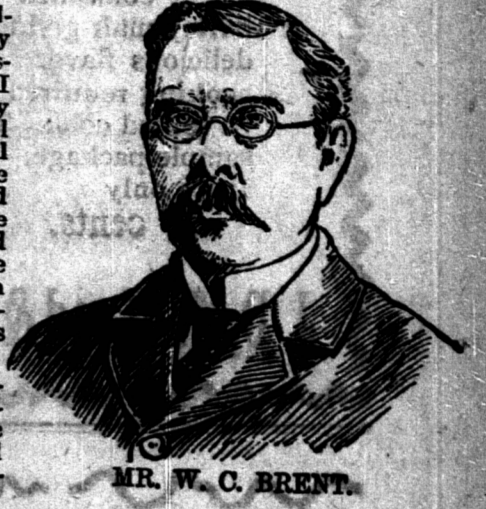
